In the event of an emergency at your child's school, it is important to know these terms:

# LOCKDOWN

Used to secure school buildings and grounds during incidents that pose an immediate threat of violence in a school building or on school grounds.

# LOCKOUT

Used to secure school buildings and grounds during incidents that pose an immediate concern outside of the school and/or surrounding area.

## ♦ HOLD-IN-PLACE

Used to limit movement of students and staff while dealing with short term emergencies.

### SHELTER-IN-PLACE

Used to shelter students and staff inside the building for an extended period of time when it's safer inside the building or room than outside.

# EVACUATE

Used to transfer students and staff from the building to a safe alternate location.

# **School Emergency Response Protocols**

A school crisis can take a number of forms including an environmental event, such as a chemical spill or gas leak; a weather emergency; such as a tornado warning; or an intruder in or near the school. The nature of a school crisis dictates whether school officials will put in place a lockdown, lockout, hold-in-place, shelter-in-place, evacuation or any combination of two of these protocols, as a means to ensure the safety and well-being of students and staff.

# What if I'm on campus during an emergency?

# LOCKDOWN PROCEDURES FOR VISITORS

If a lockdown is called while you are attending a school function before, during or after school, remain in place and wait for further directions. In a lockdown, doors to the auditorium, classrooms and gyms will be locked. If you are in a hallway, look for the nearest exit and exit the building.

# ❖ STROBE LIGHT EMERGENCY SYSTEM

Each of our buildings has an exterior strobe light emergency system. The strobe light system, which includes sounds and lights, will be activated when there is a drill in progress or an actual emergency. If it is activated when you are approaching any campus, please return to your vehicle. Access to buildings is prohibited during drills and emergencies.

# The Role of Parents in an Emergency

In a school emergency, the first instinct as a parent is to pick up the telephone and start calling the school or rush to the school and get your child/children. The truth is this only complicates matters from a safety and security standpoint.

Parents too close to an incident often hinder the rescue attempts of police, EMS and fire officials on the scene. The best action parents can take in an emergency is to stay close to their phone and e-mail and to monitor local radio and TV reports for regular updates and instructions.

# In Case of a School Emergency

Although your first reaction would be to call or rush to your child's school, **please** follow the tips listed below.



DO tune into local TV/Radio stations for official school news alerts.

DO rely <u>only</u> on official communication from school or public safety officials.

DO listen for official information regarding reunification with your child(ren).



DO NOT call or rush to your child's school. Your presence could interfere with emergency responders.

DO NOT phone your child or school. Staff and students are discouraged from using cell phone communication for safety reasons.

# How will I reunite with my child(ren)?

Parents/guardians will be directed by school or public safety officials to their child(ren)'s specific location. This will be done through TV/radio and/or the District's Blackboard Connect System (phone call and email). Students will be released ONLY to parents/guardians who are documented as emergency contacts and who present a picture ID such as a driver's license, military ID or passport.

The reunification process can be time-consuming and will be dependent upon the specific circumstances. Be assured that our first priority will always be the safety and security of our students and staff.
