

How to Apply for Section 8 Assistance

Applicants must also demonstrate proof of citizenship or residency in the United States to qualify for the program. This typically involves presenting documents such as a passport or resident alien card when applying.

Criminal Background Checks

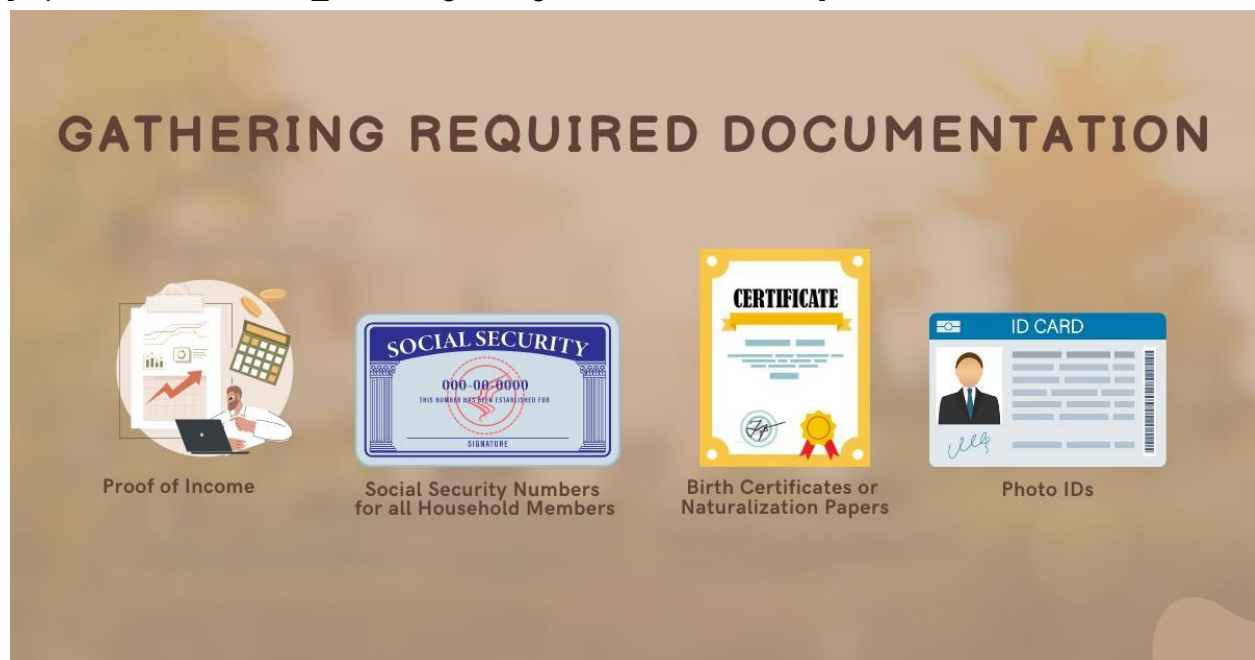
