Courthouse Garden

The garden was planted in late May. The committee was challenged by the soil conditions and limited budget provided by the County. The soil was amended with donations from the Master Gardener committee members. The committee used a design plan that included a red, white and blue theme using salvia, alyssum and vinca.

Extension Garden

Activities/Goals:

Sign Garden: Planned/established in 2019. Native plants filling in from 2020 seeding and transplants. More seeding in 2021. Mulch from Morshes Park. Plants labeled.

Native Shrub Garden: Planned in 2020. 2021: Grass dug out. Soil brought in from donation pile at Fairgrounds. Bare root shrubs installed. Cardboard placed over remaining grass. Mulch from Morsches Park. Plants labeled.

2022 Plans: Maintenance both gardens. Hope exterior spigot will be installed in rear of Extension building in 2021. Label new seedling species when they emerge.

Committee members helped with installation and maintenance of both gardens. Work Release Crew helped dig out grass/spread soil in Shrub Garden. Seeds/plants donated by various master gardeners. To expand native plant diversity, seeds also purchased from Prairie Moon Nursery.
