The title reflects the main topic of the article. The title should be simple, concise and informative in sentence case format. The title consists of a maximum of 15 words and is written using title case and bold, with a size of 12 pt. Avoid using titles with parenthesis openings ()

1. Introduction

The introduction should contain (sequentially) the general background and research question or hypothesis. If there is literature review, it can be included in this chapter or written title on another contain. The study objective should be written at the end of the introduction.

Literature Review

The literature review represents the theoretical core of an article. The purpose of a literature review is to “look again” (re + view) at what other researchers have done regarding a specific topic (Leedy & Ormrod, 2010, p. 70). A literature review is a means to an end, namely to provide background to and serve as motivation for the objectives and hypotheses that guide one’s own research. A good literature review should not merely provide a summary of previous relevant research; the researcher is also expected to critically evaluate, re-organize and synthesize the work of others (Leedy & Ormrod, 2010, p. 84).

2. Method

The research methods should elaborate on the method utilized in addressing the issues including the method of analysis. It should contain enough details allowing the reader to evaluate the appropriateness of methods as well as the reliability and validity of findings.

3. Results and Discussion

The results and discussion contain the results of the research findings and discussion. Write down the findings obtained from the results of the research that has been done and must be supported by adequate data. The results of research and findings must be able to answer the research question or hypothesis in the introduction.

4. Conclusion

The concluding statement should contain summary and suggestion. The summary should exemplify the answers provided to the hypothesis and/or research objectives or acquired findings. The summary should not contain repetition of research results and discussions, and it should instead contain a summation of research results and findings as expected in the research objective or hypothesis. The suggestions should present matters that will subsequently be conducted in relation to the research’s ensuing concepts.

Acknowledgements, avoiding identifying any of the authors prior to peer review.

References at the end of the manuscript should be written in APA (American Psychological Association) Citation Style. Cite only items that you have read and on footnotes. Please use Reference Manager Applications like EndNote, Mendeley, Zotero, etc. 80% of references consist of scientific journals that have been published in the last 10 (ten) years, the remaining 20% can be in the form

of research articles or research reports (thesis, books and other relevant publications). All publications cited in the text should be included as a list of Bibliography, arranged alphabetically by author.

Tables, Figures and Graphs

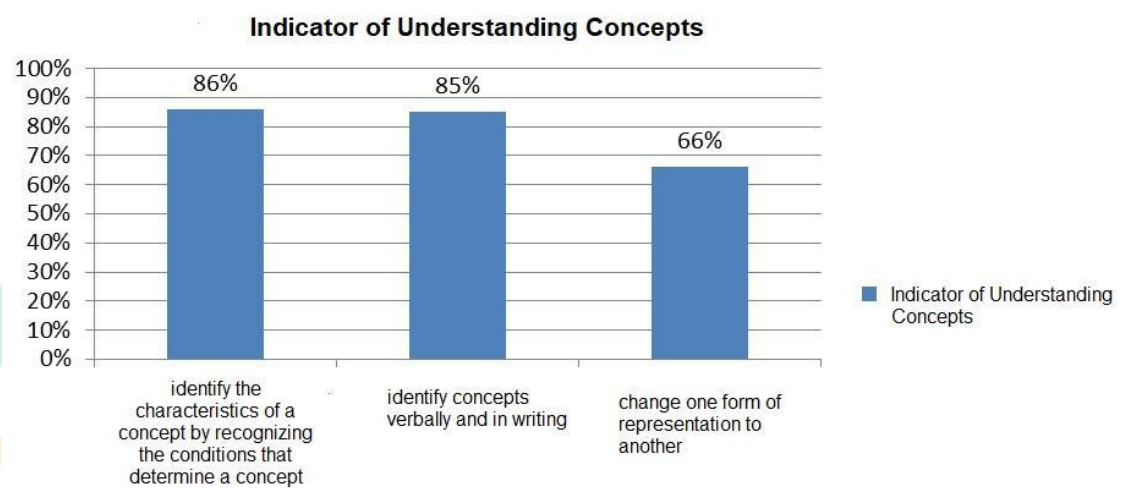
