Root meanings of words.

Words can come from different **root languages**. Explain the root meaning of **one term**.

Tip

- Try using a Google search asking “where does the word _____ come from?”
- Make sure to look down the list of sources to find one with a clear explanation. Don’t just use the first one made by AI without checking if there are other better ones first.

Example

The word **scientific** comes from the Latin word *scire*, meaning "to know" or "to have knowledge". So, scientific means using a way of learning that builds knowledge. In science, we observe and do experiments.

Extra activity.

Words can have different forms like nouns (names), verbs (actions) and adjectives (describe).

- A noun is a word you can put “a” or “an” in front of, or it is the name for something.
- A verb is an action word that you can add “to” before it, or “ing” at the end.
- An adjective is a describing word you can sometimes add “ive” or “ly” to the end.

Example: “to observe” is the action (verb) for “observation” (noun).
