Research shows that reading 30 minutes a day with a child can impact their life forever. When parents read with their children, it creates a positive impact for their child that creates avenues for success in school and in the community.

How Can You Help?

THE FIRST FIVE YEARS.

From birth to age 5, a child's brain develops more, and more rapidly, than at any other time in life. While genetics play a significant role, scientific research has made clear that the quality of a child's experiences in the first few years of life - positive or negative - helps shape how their brain develops. These experiences have a lasting impact on their health and ability to learn and succeed in school and in life.

A study done by First Things First discovered that at birth, the average baby's brain is about a quarter of the size of the average adult brain. Incredibly, it doubles the size in the first year and keeps growing to about 80% of adult size by age 3 and 90% - nearly full grown- by age 5.

helpmegrown.org says that reading is one of the best ways to promote a child's brain development. Even before he/she can recognize letters or words, reading kick starts with language and communication skills. Hearing words and seeing pictures connects the two in a child's mind. Repeating the same books further builds recognition between the words you speak and the images on the page. As a child grows, ask him/her to point to specific pictures on the page like "Where is the dog?"


