
**SECTION A**

**Q1. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow.**

I	Kausani is a picturesque town nestled in the central Himalayas at an elevation of 6,075 feet. Covering a modest 5.2 sq. kms, it resides north of Almora in the scenic Kaumaon region of Uttarakhand. The town offers a breathtaking 300 km panoramic view of the Himalayas, with snow-capped peaks standing in majestic rows. The prominent Nanda Devi, India's second-highest mountain, is the star attraction at a height of 25,645 feet, 36 miles away.
II	Among the other notable peaks visible are Choukhamba (23,420 feet) and Trishul (23,360 feet), accompanied by Nilkanth, Nandaghunti, Nandaghat, and Nandakot. The sky's vivid blue on clear days provides a splendid backdrop to these towering peaks, creating a mesmerizing sight at sunrise and sunset when the sky transforms into a golden orange hue. This spectacle left Mahatma Gandhi awe-struck during his 1929 visit, leading him to dub Kausani the 'Switzerland of India.' His stay extended to fourteen days, during which he penned the book 'Anashakti Yoga' in a guest house, later renamed 'Anashakti Ashram.'
III	<p>Kausani holds significance as the birthplace of Sumitranandan Pant, one of India's greatest modern poets, whose poems drew inspiration from its natural surroundings. Tea gardens intermingle with dense pine forests and fruit orchards, creating a serene ambiance.</p> <p>The region also hosts numerous fairs and religious ceremonies. Kausani, often considered God's own backyard, embraces tranquility, devoid of traffic and haste. If serenity could be painted, it would mirror the charm of Kausani.</p>
IV	Kausani's charm isn't limited to its panoramic views and poetic heritage — it also offers a rich cultural experience. The town hosts several vibrant fairs and festivals, such as the Uttarayani Fair, celebrated with great fervor. These events are not only religious gatherings but also social occasions where locals showcase their traditional music, dance, and crafts. The local cuisine, with its flavors deeply rooted in Kumaoni traditions, adds to the immersive experience, offering visitors a taste of the region's culinary heritage.
V	For nature enthusiasts and trekkers, Kausani serves as a gateway to numerous trekking trails that weave through forests of oak, cedar, and rhododendron. The popular Rudrahari Falls trek takes

	adventurers through ancient caves and scenic landscapes, while the Pindari Glacier trek offers a more challenging yet rewarding journey. Birdwatchers can also revel in the town's biodiversity, as Kausani is home to a variety of Himalayan avian species. Whether one seeks spiritual solace, artistic inspiration, or an adventurous escape, Kausani unfolds its beauty in countless ways, leaving an indelible mark on every visitor's heart.

<b>Q2. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow.</b>		
I	The magnitude 9.0 Japan's Tohoku Earthquake occurred at 14 :46 local time on Friday. 11 March 2011, 125 km east coast of Honshu and 380 km far from Tokyo and rattled the large parts of Japan and some part of east China and Russia with 30 km depth of the hypocentre. This earthquake that lasted approximately 3 minutes (170 seconds) caused a 130 km long by 159 km wide rupture zone on the pacific plate subduction zone and followed by a huge tsunami with more than 40 meter waves. The destructive aftermaths of this incident made an irreparable disaster not only for the Japan, but also for the whole world because except for the enormous death toll and debris, the damages of nuclear power plants were a hazardous unexpected tragedy.	
II	According to the report of the Japanese National Police Agency, 15854 dead. 3167 missing and 26992 injured across twenty prefectures are the result of this devastating earthquake and tsunami	

	which ruined more than 125000 buildings. Moreover, it caused long blackouts for more than 4.4 million buildings and left 1.5 million buildings out of water for days, also large fires were triggered one after another even for weeks after the main quake.	
III	Explosion and demolition of the Fukushima I Nuclear Power Plant (Fukushima Daiichi), which generated radioactive contamination near the plant's area with irreversible damages to the environment, was one the most significant issues of this catastrophe and ranked 7 (the most severe level for nuclear power plant) based on the International Nuclear Event Scale, similar to the Chernobyl disaster on 26 April 1986. Therefore, it is not strange to consider to this earthquake as the most important destructive seismic event of the beginning of the twenty first century in the advanced industrial world. Division of total 19100 death and missed people by the reason as of 10th March 2012 (CATDAT) is as follows:
