Digital Women's Archive North [DWAN] is delighted to support Mahboobeh Rajabi's application to Arts Council England, evolving our creative collaboration.

DWAN is a feminist arts and heritage organisation, founded by Jenna C. Ashton and Kevin Malone. DWAN supports women to identify, collect, disseminate and celebrate their cultural heritage and practices through creative and digital interventions. We use feminist curatorial and archival methods to support women's active citizenship and self empowerment, using cultural heritage and arts archives as a basis for finding solutions to inequalities.

Through our focus on equity, equality and empowerment, our work directly contributes to supporting the diversification of heritage-making, heritage skilling, and the visibility of marginalised heritage.

## Core activities:

- 1. Co-creating our digital space that will function as an archive, educational resource and alternative media outlet, supporting the connectivity, campaigns and cultural resistance and resilience of female practitioners and organisations.
- 2. Collaborative and creative feminist archival and heritage projects.
- 3. Delivering educational public engagement events around arts, heritage and feminist practice.

new approaches for digital and material archiving and curation. We have engaged 60 international partners and organisations in identifying areas of excellence within feminist museological practice.

Our creative collaboration with Mahboobeh began in 2017, with The Travelling Heritage Bureau: a co-research project and supportive network with and for international women artists based in the North West of England. Since then, we worked with Mahboobeh as part of a diverse artist studio experiment, the Centre for International Women Artists (CIWA). Most recently, we facilitated the project "Girlhood" in response to an ESRC research project, working with 5 international women artists as Creative Consultants - of which Mahboobeh was one. This work supported Mahboobeh to engage with an intergenerational and global exploration of girlhood experiences frequently negated or suppressed within cultural memory. The discussion and creative outcomes of this project will soon be live via our archive site.

We are delighted to continue working with Mahboobeh as a Partner on this project around arts, women's rights and histories in Iran.

We will support the project in the following ways:

- Advice and guidance regarding a feminist archival practice, and methods for archiving and documenting the project.
- Promote and disseminate the project focusing on networks and outlets on women's cultural heritage and archiving.
- Support Mahboobeh's public engagement plans and activities.
- Connect the project with our own arts and culture contacts in Iran/ Iranian diaspora. Continue to advocate for international and BIPOC women artists.

Mahboobeh is a very talented, generous, and insightful female arts leader of her generation, and we wholly encourage you support this application. She has a fabulous career ahead of her.

This involves supporting BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, and disabled artists to meaningfully co-created solutions to address educational barriers, and ensuring diverse cultural practices are represented.

For the duration of the project, we will support Mahboobeh as an Affiliate Artist Researcher within ICP. We will mentor Mahboobeh through her research, including supporting access to additional resources and methodology needs.

Mahboobeh will also be invited to offer Masterclass sessions for students, and to connect to UoM's Creative Manchester initiative. Plus, ICP as a whole will support consultation work around the issue of refugee barrier to arts-culture education.
