Girls Soccer Downs Brookwood Anna Leavitt Nets a Hat Trick

When Bartlett Field was just too wet from the weekend's rain the GUS girl's soccer game on Monday was moved over to Brookwood. Despite playing on the road, instead of the anticipated home game, the girls avenged an early season loss to this same Brookwood squad by earning a hard fought 4-2 victory. Anna Leavitt notched 3 first half goals to give the GUS girls a comfortable 3-0 lead at halftime. The first goal came in the 5th minute courtesy of an excellent crossing pass from Barrett D'Orio from the right corner to the well positioned Leavitt. Just one minute later she struck again. This time she intercepted a clearing pass on the left side and drilled a shot just inside the far post. GUS continued to control the play and Leavitt made it 3-0 in the 25th minute when she corralled a Brookwood goal-kick and her hard, low shot was

too much for the keeper. Mikaila Bennett was also instrumental at her stopper position seemingly turning back every offensive advance form

Brookwood. She was supported well by backs Ani Stephan, Aisling Twombly and sweeper Ava Meyer. Elsa Reulet, Luka Bornhorst also logged some time on the back line to go with their duties in the midfield. Kryn Fortune, Zoe Moriarty, Parker Leavitt and Maggie Delay also played well in the midfield. Piper Shepherd was in net and made several saves in blanking Brookwood for the half.

After the halftime break Brookwood came out determined to begin the second half and quickly the GUS lead to 3-2 in just the first five minutes of the half. On both goals Brookwood was able to gain control of the ball and attack the goal. GUS was able to regain their composure fairly quickly and hold off the Brookwood. For the next 20-minutes of play both teams had their chances but neither could find the net. Then with just under five minutes to go the Boars were able to up their lead on a beautiful play. It began with D'Orio, now in goal, making a good save. She proceeded to roll a lead pass up to Shepherd on the right side. After a quick dribble Shepherd made a forward pass to Anna Leavitt. Leavitt in turn rushed up the right side of the field before crossing an excellent pass to Eliza Loring who knocked in an excellent shot past the keeper. With the GUS lead now 4-2 the defense took over and held on for the victory.

Boys Swamp Brookwood

It what turned out to be their final game the GUS boys soccer team ended their season on a high note with solid 4-1 victory at Brookwood on Monday. Leo Bertone struk first in the game scoring for GUS in the 18th minute. Sammy Kniker attacked up the right side of the field and as he moved towards the goal a Brookwood defender knocked it away where Bertone gained control and found the back of the net in the bottom right corner. GUS held the 1-0 lead until the final minute of the half when Brookwood scored a nice goal from a tough angle 18-yards from the goal. His sent the game to the halftime break knotted at 1. It was a very good half for GUS especially on the defensive end. Ben O'Connor and Walter Nelson spurred the effort from the sweeper and stopper positions respectively. Nathaniel Flynn and Max Crafton began at wing back with Michael Todd and Morgan Proops rotating in. Luke Kotwicki and Cal White lined up at center midfield with Bertone, Freddy Kniker and Elliott Thompson on the sides. At striker Coaches Bartsch and DesBois used Ciaran Mohan, Ethan Watts and Marshall Aptt. Sammy Parisi was in net where he made a few strong saves.

After the mid-game break GUS came out strong and controlled the play throughout the second half. GUS grabbed the lead back in the 40th minute when O'Connor headed in a very nice goal on a Parisi corner kick. GUS made it 3-1 in the 53rd minute. Parisi made a strong and low cross from the right side and Freddy Kniker was able to stretch himself to the limit to get a foot on the ball and off a defender and past the keeper. A true hustle goal. Nelson closed out the scoring, and the game, scoring in the 59th minute when he launched a beautiful shot from 20-yards out. GUS had some other chances when the hit the crossbar on a shot and also a missed penalty kick. Coach DesBois was very pleased with the team's effort and highlighted the good passing the team displayed in linking the defense, midfield and strikers.

Cross Country Team Sweeps

After an excellent showing last week at the Jim Munn Invitational the GUS cross country team followed that up with a strong performance on Tuesday at the Iron Rail Fields. Going up against the host Landmark Vikings and the Tower Tigers the Runnin' Boars won the meet overall, and if you broke it up into boys and girls races they swept those as well. The day was overcast, cool and damp. The Iron Rail course has many different elements - woods, grass, dirt and a small hill - to navigate and the Boars attacked it very well. Manny DeAngelis led Gang Green finishing 2nd overall in 14:20, 0:13 behind the winner from Landmark. After another Viking landed in 3rd place Max Clarke checked in 4th in 15:04. The first Tiger came in 5th just ahead of Henry Nelson (6th, 15:16) and Carter Long (7th, 15:20). Thea Glass set the pace for the girls as the top finisher and 9th overall (15:30). After two boys form Landmark and Tower came a good green line led by Lucy Grant (17:12), Charlie Swanson (17:26) and Clire Lewis (17:38). Catherine Carroll (18:50) was next for GUS, followed by Wyatt

When scoring the meet as one race GUS came out on top with 28 points to Landmark's 38 and Tower 50. As a boys race GUS had 30, Landmark 34 and Tower 50. Neither Landmark or Tower had enough girls to score but GUS took places 1-5 to sweep.

This was the final team race of the season, but GUS does have at least four runners headed to the Massachusetts State Middle School Cross Country Championships to be held on Saturday, November 9 in Devens, MA.
