Welcome to piano class at Northwest School of the Arts! We hope that piano class will help students develop a useful skill that will enrich their lives long after they leave our school.

OBJECTIVES

In piano class, students will:

- Demonstrate an understanding of musical notation. Units to be covered include the circle of fifths, drawing all major key signatures, identifying minor key signatures, interval ear training, and identification of major/minor triads in root position and inversions.
- Continue development of correct piano technique, including posture, hand position, fingering, articulation styles, legato pedaling, and use of body weight to create variations in sound.
- Explore the history of the instrument and influential composers of its music. Time periods to be covered include Baroque, Classical, Romantic, 20th Century, and Impressionism.
- Continue applying notation to the creation of individual compositions that use knowledge of chord structure to harmonize melodies
- Develop sight reading skills
- Develop ear training skills
- Participate in quarterly recitals during the school day (all students) and two evening recitals during the year (12/16/25 and 5/14/26 - as selected by teacher based on readiness and good academic standing)
- Participate in the National Federation of Music Clubs Festival at Wingate University if chosen by the teacher (2/28/26)

Please note that a greater emphasis will be placed on standard literature, performance, technique, duet/ensemble playing, and sight reading than in the beginners' levels.

MATERIALS

Students will need the following supplies for this course:

- Alfred Premier Piano Course lesson book and performance book (purchased and paid for by school – see links below)
- Pencils (Enough to last the entire year!)
- Plastic 3-Ring notebook with dividers (1”) - available to borrow, due back by 5/26/26
- Sheet protectors (for keeping sheet music secure)
- Container of disinfecting wipes

Thanks to the CMS Magnet Office, there is not a cost for headphones or lesson books for the 5th year in a row. However, all students are expected to help with fundraising (see “Bank of America Fundraising Participation” section for more information).

There is an additional learning cost fee of \$75 for all piano students, which covers music theory/ear training software, apps, games, and digital music. Payment must be made with credit card through Cut Time. The due date is Friday, September 26, 2025 unless an arrangement has already been discussed with your music teacher and/or booster treasurer. Families who prefer a payment plan should reach out to the teacher for options.

Please note that students who advance to the next level of books during the year and have paid their class fee will be provided these materials at no additional cost.

Just in case, I am including the recommended links for purchasing the required Alfred Premier piano method books. If your student has books from previous years and does not need to change levels, no action is required. All students will receive their book placements in class during the on-boarding days in August.

EQUIPMENT CARE

The piano department was fortunate to have the funds to purchase eighteen Yamaha Arius digital pianos during the summer of 2017. We are blessed to be able to provide our students with a beautiful lab of instruments. It is imperative that all students treat lab equipment with respect and report any problems or possible damage to the instructor immediately. All students will be given an assigned piano to work on that they are responsible for. **Students who repeatedly play around on lab equipment will lose their playing privilege and be given alternate written assignments.** **PLEASE NOTE THAT STUDENTS ARE FINANCIALLY RESPONSIBLE IN THE EVENT OF DAMAGE TO LAB MATERIALS BEYOND NORMAL WEAR AND TEAR!**

COMMUNICATION EXPECTATIONS

When sending emails to your teacher you need to include the following:

- A clear subject line
- A properly formatted email (“Dear Mrs. Stonnell”, use complete sentences, and a closing: “Sincerely, student name”)
- All emails should be written in a professional and respectful manner. Remember you are emailing your teacher and not texting a friend.

Do not share documents with Mrs. Stonnell via email. All assignments need to be turned into Canvas unless otherwise indicated by the teacher.

CLASSROOM RULES

1. Students should be at assigned pianos with materials when the bell rings.
2. Gum, food, and drinks (except water) are not allowed in the lab.
3. Students should play with headphones ON unless otherwise told by the teacher.
4. All piano bench legs must remain on the floor.
5. Students should refrain from talking during individual practice time.

Please note that any personal belongings such as combs, brushes, lotion, perfumes, make-up, toys, cards, video games, cell phones, etc. will not be allowed at the student’s seat and will be taken away if seen during class! Chromebooks should only be used with teacher permission.

CONSEQUENCES

Excellent behavior and character is expected of ALL students in this course. In addition to the consequences outlined in the Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook, the following set of consequences will be enforced in this class:

- 1st Infraction - Warning
- 2nd Infraction - Phone Call
- 3rd Infraction - Bounced to Another Class
- 4th Infraction - Referral/Parent Conference

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance will be taken in each of your classes every day, including Homeroom. You are expected to attend all classes and engage in coursework following the established bell schedule. You must be present in class 51% or more of the scheduled time to be marked present. If you are unable to attend class, you are expected to contact the teacher to obtain assignments.

Please note that students who miss their regularly scheduled weekly lesson due to absence may need to submit a video of their practice progress in Canvas to earn make-up credit if time is not available in class. Per CMS Policy, all students have **five school days** following an absence to submit make-up work for credit. It is the student's responsibility to initiate contact with the teacher to obtain any additional missing assignments! All make-up work must be submitted by 2:15 pm on the fifth school day following the absence to be accepted for full credit. **Failure to submit a video by the specified deadline for an absence will result in the student earning a "0" for that week's practice grade.** This policy applies to all absences, including excused absences, unexcused absences, field trips, and suspensions.

FINAL EXAM EXEMPTION POLICY

High school students who meet the criteria below may be exempt from taking a final exam in a course that does not require participation in a state-required (i.e CTE) or End of Course Assessment:

Students with a grade of an 'A' (90%) or above and no more than 3 absences.

Students with a grade of a 'B' (80%) or above with no more than 1 absence.

Students have the option to take the final exam to improve their grade rather than the exemption. If a student chooses to take the exam, CMS grading practices are followed, and the exam counts for 20% of the student's final grade.

For students that have an undue hardship with attendance due to not having transportation established as a new or MCV student or has a documented medical/health condition through an IEP or 504, the principal may exempt the student from participating in a non-EOC/state required final exam if the student has met the academic criteria.

Students who participate and complete Advanced Placement exams may choose to take the teacher-made final to include in their final grade for the class.

ACCESSING COURSE WORK

All class work will be posted through Canvas, the district-mandated learning management system. I will use the following guidelines for our Canvas course:

1. New assignments will be posted each Sunday at 12:00 am for the following week.
2. All assignments for the week will be due each Friday by 2:15 pm.
3. Assignments will remain open past the due date until the end of the quarter, but late work will receive lesser credit (see late work policy).

GRADING

Individual student progress will be monitored on digital checklists shared through Google. **Special solo pieces will be given only to those students whose work ethic merits it.** All students are expected to continue working out of their regular lesson books on a DAILY BASIS. This is necessary to continue building reading skills! The teacher has the final say over any literature that the student performs. Students must meet minimum quarterly requirements in order to earn a passing grade for the year. Students are expected to work to their maximum potential and will play for the teacher at least one a week, either through one-on-one lessons or submitting recordings!

20% Prepare (warm-ups, daily theory exercise completion, homework)

30% Rehearse (weekly lesson preparation, quizzes, Canvas work)

50% Perform (performance tests, written tests, recitals, projects, research)

**** Students will earn a bi-weekly lesson grade that will be scored on a rubric. Only those students who are truly prepared for weekly lessons and show consistent progress will earn full credit. Students who do not show up to weekly lessons or submit video evidence of their progress will not receive credit. Furthermore, students lose lesson points when they fail to meet established deadlines for learning solo pieces.** Excellent preparation for class is expected at all times!

**** All students are expected to remain in good academic standing. Continued poor grades may result in the student being removed from the class!**

AUDITIONED EVENING RECITALS

All students in proficient piano will be given two opportunities during the school year to audition for a seat on evening recital programs scheduled for 12/16/25 and 5/14/26. Due to the large number of students in the program and time constraints, participation is limited to no more than 20 pianists per recital. Being selected for these opportunities is a privilege and should be treated as such.

Students must meet the following criteria to be selected for evening recitals:

- 1. No missing assignments in piano as of the audition date**
- 2. A minimum score of 90% on the audition rubric**
 - a. The teacher reserves the right to raise the cut-off score if there are too many qualified candidates.**
- 3. NO ISS OR OSS during the recital preparation window**
 - a. For example, students could not have ISS or OSS from October-December during the preparation window for the December recital.**

Only those students who are truly ready and meet all criteria will be given the opportunity to perform on evening recitals. ALL STUDENTS are expected to leave evening recital dates open and plan on attending unless otherwise told by the teacher! Those students who are not selected for evening recitals are still required to perform during the school day (see attached calendar for dates).

GRADING POLICIES AND LATE WORK

Students are expected to turn in all assignments and meet all deadlines (including performance-related tasks) by the specified due date. Late work will receive lesser credit, with a penalty of 10 points deduction PER WEEK late. The maximum score that a student can receive on an assignment submitted one week after the perform deadline is a "50 – F".

If a student is absent on the day that a long-term assignment is due, the student must be prepared to submit their work on the day of his or her return to avoid late work penalties. This applies only to

assignments that were given prior to a student's absence. **Please note that any work not submitted by the specified due date will receive a score of "0" in the gradebook until it is turned in.**

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS TO EARN A PASSING GRADE IN PIANO

Students must sign off AT LEAST 2 songs each quarter from their assigned Alfred Premier lesson books to earn a passing quarterly average (average of 1 song every 4 1/2 weeks). Songs DO NOT include technical exercises as indicated on the digital checklist. Students who take private lessons have the option of working on other material for this credit, but must receive approval of the teacher first. Students are expected to sign off AT LEAST 8 book songs (2 per quarter) in order to earn a passing score for the year. In addition, students must also meet the following quarterly requirements.

- **Quarter 1: Students must learn and perform a selection from the National Federation of Music Clubs festival list in preparation for adjudication in February.**
- **Quarter 2: Students must learn and perform a winter solo for our recital in December.**
- **Quarter 3: Students must successfully memorize and perform a classical work by a non-American composer and a selection from the National Federation of Music Clubs festival list (learned in October). In addition to the school recital, students have the option of performing these selections for adjudication on festival day, scheduled for 2/28/26 at Wingate University.**
- **Quarter 4: Students must learn and perform a popular solo for our recital in May.**

ACADEMIC PROBATION

At Northwest, it is critical that all students maintain acceptable grades in all of their core academic and arts classes. Students who fail two classes will be placed on academic probation at the end of the quarter.

Students placed on academic probation are ineligible to participate in any activity outside the regular school day or any activity during the school day that removes them from academic classes. Examples of these activities may include play rehearsals, non-curricular concerts/recitals, and field trips. Each student's academic standing is evaluated by the guidance counselors at the time of each report card distribution. A letter is generated by the student's counselor informing the student and his/her parents that the student is on academic probation. A list of all students on academic probation is compiled each quarter and conveyed to teachers in a confidential manner.

Students placed on academic probation remain on probation until the next report card date. If a student's grades have improved, their name will be removed from the list at this time. If a student has not improved the grade to a passing score, they continue to remain on probation until the next reporting period.

FIELD TRIPS

Students must maintain a F1 (final grade) average of 70% (C) or higher in all classes to be eligible for participation in non-required field trips. All field trip opportunities in the piano department are non-required, which include both day and overnight trips. **Please be aware that trip refunds ARE NOT guaranteed should a student be removed from a trip due to failure to maintain a "C" average. Additionally, students who are suspended (either ISS or OSS) are automatically ineligible for participation in field trip opportunities.**

INFINITE CAMPUS/GRADE REPORTING

Parents and students are highly encouraged to check grades and assignments on a weekly basis through Parent Portal or Student Portal, a part of the Infinite Campus network. **Parent access instructions are available by clicking [HERE](#).** Parent involvement is critical to student success, and I am always willing to discuss your child's progress with you!

MULTI-TIERED SYSTEMS OF SUPPORT (MTSS)

Northwest School of the Arts expects nothing less than the best effort from all of our students. All Visual and Performing Arts magnet students in grades 6-12 are expected to fulfill minimum course requirements related to the magnet theme in order to maintain active status and to continue to the next grade level in the magnet program. Students must pass all arts courses they are enrolled in each year to remain at the school for the following year.

All parents of students that are in danger of failing or failing an arts course at Northwest will be contacted by the instructor in a timely manner to begin the MTSS process. MTSS is designed to help the student become more successful in the arts path that he or she has chosen. To facilitate this process, the teacher and parent(s) set up a conference to develop a plan with the student for increased support and continued monitoring of student progress.

Students who continue to fail arts courses jeopardize their future enrollment at Northwest. **Any student who receives a failing grade in an arts course at the end of the academic year will lose their seat at Northwest for not meeting the minimum magnet requirements.**
