## INDIVIDUAL ORAL COMMENTARY GUIDE

- 1. Remember that you should present a FORMAL oral commentary. Even if the register of the text is informal, your IOC should be academic
- 2. Organize your comment: intro, body & conclusion. Explain in your intro how your commentary will be organized
- 3. Be aware of the time
- 4. Provide a personal analysis, as much as possible.
- 5. Situate the extract in the work (context info) and indicate the significance of the extract for the work as a whole
- 6. Do not make comments/remarks assuming the listener knows what you are talking about
- 7. Do not paraphrase or summarize the extract
- 8. Take into consideration the genre of your extract and the specific characteristics of each genre in order to provide a thorough, well focused analysis
- 9. The more specific and the more detailed your analysis is, the more points it will get
- 10. Excellent candidates often offer more than one interpretation showing their understanding and appreciation for ambiguities or subtleties of the extract and for the extract in relation to the larger work.
- 11. Do not focus on literary devices without understanding the relevance they have for the passage. MEANING: Do not overly focus on features such as alliteration or onomatopoeia to the neglect of a full understanding of the manner in which a character is being shaped or truly understanding theme as a meaningful idea rather than just a topic or motif.
- 12. Each word, each image needs to be discussed in its own context to offer a valid discussion of its effect. Remember each extract is roughly 40 lines and every fifth line is numbered for ease of reference for both the candidate and the moderator
- 13. Avoid providing biographical or contextual info that is not relevant
- 14. Finish your commentary with a rounded conclusion that refers to the passage as a whole
