Description: So far in this block, you have been revisiting some of the major analytic perspectives and theorists covered in the first year, going a little deeper into the material, and focusing on modes of therapeutic action. In this first of a three class series, I will introduce Intersubjectivity Theory, integrating some familiar and related concepts that were addressed in the first year classes on embeddedness and infant research as I outline the intersubjectivist perspective. In the next two classes you will learn more about Self Psychology as well. Both Intersubjectivity Theory and Self Psychology emphasize empathy and affect regulation and these key modes of therapeutic action will be the main focus of the three class series. Please note the podcast I have asked that you listen to in preparation for class along with the primary reading. There is no requirement for a written reflection for this class.

Program Objectives:

At the end of the program, participants will be able to:

- 1. Describe phenomenological contextualism and how this way of thinking has been adapted to psychoanalysis in the form of intersubjectivity theory.
- 2. Define and apply the concept of organizing principles within an intersubjective framework, contrasting this approach with more classical conceptions of transference.
- 3. Consider some of the clinical implications of "emotional dwelling" as described by Stolorow.

She volunteers teaching psychiatry residents at the University of Pittsburgh, providing psychotherapy supervision through a local low-fee clinic, the Clinic Without Walls, and is an active Faculty member at the Western Pennsylvania Community for Psychoanalytic Therapies where she teaches psychoanalytic theory and technique.
