

# Workshop Descriptions

# Monday, June 9: 8:30-3:30 with Lunch 11:30-12:30

K-8 Math with Dr. Eliza Sorte-Thomas at PPE: Join Eliza for a day of gearing up and gearing down to differentiate for your mathematical learners. In any given classroom, on any given day there are objectives that need to be met by learners with different needs and skills. Learn a "mindset" while doing activities and playing games to meet a variety of learners' needs by using the grade level's standards and your students' skills to adjust, adapt, and support achievement.

#### Participants will:

Work on building gearing up and gearing down steps to meet mathematical standards.

Play games and adjust them to meet the content and needs of their learners.

Reflect on structures, strategies, and activities so they are implementable in their educational setting.

6-12 HMH Into Literature, Getting Started Session at EHHS \*ELA Teachers: In this session, participants will explore the essential components of Into Literature and its instructional model, walk through a lesson, and practice accessing key resources. They will engage with the colleagues on how to implement their new curriculum successfully and plan out pacing.

6-12 Fostering Positive Relationships: Overcoming Mindsets, De-escalation Strategies, and Building Therapeutic Rapport with Students with Ray Sebestyen at EHHS in the 227 Academy Room: This course is designed for educators, counselors, and other professionals working with students in diverse environments. The focus is on understanding and overcoming negative mindsets, implementing de-escalation techniques, and cultivating therapeutic rapport to create supportive, effective, and nurturing learning environments. Through interactive discussions, role-playing scenarios, and evidence-based practices, participants will gain the skills and knowledge needed to build strong, trusting relationships with students and address the unique challenges many face in school settings.

### Tuesday, June 10: 8:30-3:30 with Lunch 11:30-12:30

K-12 Writing Rope with Genevieve Thomas at EHHS: This interactive workshop explores the importance of writing instruction and the research-based practices that support the development of students as writers across grade levels. Participants will deepen their understanding of The Writing Rope, a comprehensive framework for the essential components of effective writing instruction. Through engaging activities and collaborative learning, educators will examine best practices including teaching the writing process through a model-practice-reflect cycle, using mentor texts to highlight strong writing, and explicitly teaching sentence-level syntax. By the end of the session, participants will synthesize their learning and create a practical plan to integrate these strategies into their own instruction.

9:00-Noon PreK-12 Home Visit Training with Kim Metzger & Camy Dusenberry in the EHHS Library: The workshop will address the benefits of home visits. We will discuss the positive purpose for home visits, the background of the program, how a home visit is conducted and what comes after the home visits. Hand gestures and symbols are used to represent the sounds of English. This approach can be used with beginning readers, struggling readers, Deaf/Hard-of-Hearing readers, and English Language Learners to support decoding and spelling skills which lead to increased reading comprehension and written communication.

K-8 Strength-based Strategies for Neurodiverse Students with Katherine Senecal and Heather Countryman in EHHS Library: In this session, participants will learn practical strength based strategies for neurodiverse students in the classroom. During this session, teachers will have a chance to find ways they can embed these strategies into everyday instruction, meet the needs of all learners and create an environment where they can thrive.

6-12 Engaging Students in Reading and Writing using HMH Curriculum with Bret Charlton, Jana Nygaard, Jodi Wigen \*ELA Teachers in EHHS 224: During this session we will support ELA teachers in their use of HMH. We will create a common language when teaching writing and reading strategies and ensure we are in alignment from 6th grade to 12th grade. Other topics that will be covered will be planning for accommodating students with IEPs or 504 plans, pacing, and other resources.

K-12 EdcampMT-West: Edcamp-MT West, also known as the "unconference", is a free, open, participant-driven conference. The content and schedule will be proposed and provided by the participants and is determined on the day of the event. Edcamp is comprised of flexible, discussion-based topics which rely heavily on the passions and interests of the participants. Edcamp is intended to cover all curricular areas and age-groups. Edcamp will put "learning" at center stage and look at the "Why" "What" "How" of pedagogy. # Thursday, August 21: 12:30-3:30pm

K-12 Calling all Mentors for the Afternoon of New Teacher Day: Mentoring partnerships have many benefits for both mentees and mentors. We will spend time getting to know each other, setting goals, and collaborating about how to make mentoring a powerful professional learning experience. Also spend time as a mentor/mentee team preparing for a great start to the school year. This is designed for teachers 2 years and under in-district and their mentor teachers.

\*Additional one hour sessions for mentees and mentors will be scheduled after school throughout the school year. Topics may be building specific and adjusted with mentor and mentee feedback. This time will be worth an additional 3 hours of PIR for mentees and mentors. Sessions will be scheduled October, February, and April.

Examples of topics may include, but are not limited to:

October- Conscious Discipline quick look (K-5); using data and formative assessments to drive instruction; behavior management strategies February - Celebrate successes and identify areas of growth opportunity; Parent teacher conference preparation and tips; midyear data review April- End of year data; Finishing the year strong; setting goals for next year.
