What's new?

- 29 domestic + 8 international profiles with more detailed descriptions of applicant's ECs, honors, essays, and recommendations.
- Two companion documents: one with <u>international profiles</u>, and the other a compilation of <u>admissions advice</u> <u>from the Class of 2022</u>
- An additional info section to explain atypical circumstances or key application elements which otherwise would not have been mentioned
- Advice from each applicant included in their profile

How to Use This Resource

This document is made for for all those who are applying to colleges in the upcoming cycle, as well as those who are supporting applicants (counselors, parents, siblings) and wish to be more informed about the process.

Though the mission of this year's RSMR is the same as <u>last year's</u>, the two resources differ structurally. We've decided to divide the contents of RSMR into three separate files: one with domestic profiles (this file), one with <u>international profiles</u>, and the last a <u>compilation of admissions advice</u>. This decision was made in the hopes that applicants could find more relevant profiles easier and because one RSMR document would've been nearly 90 pages long (yikes). This does not mean that international or domestic applicants should only look at their "designated" files. There are important lessons to be learnt from every profile for all applicants, regardless of where they are applying from.

We recommend that users **FIRST** read through the advice document before proceeding to the profiles themselves. It's quite easy to get lost in the results and not take in some of the amazing and insightful advice offered by recent applicants. When viewing the profiles, make sure to not focus too much one single applicant, especially outliers. Look for trends as they will be a better predictor of your success.

Notes, Disclaimers, and Warnings

- Once again, entries were collected from a very skewed, competitive and unrepresentative pool. This is but a snapshot of one's application, so take the success of each profile with a grain of salt.
- Like an admissions officer, look at both the individual entries as well as the pool of entries holistically. Don't focus too much on one part of an applicant's entry or the entry of one individual
- Ratings of ECs, honours, essays, and recommendations are all self-assessed. Please take these ratings and any descriptions of these elements with a grain of salt.
- Some profiles are very long and cross-over several pages. Make sure to scroll down!

Summary of Results

- 1. Having amazing ECs is by no means a panacea to all your application process problems. Submitting weaker essays can really be a death sentence, even for individuals with "insane" extracurriculars. This, once again, goes to show how incredibly important that applicants really spend time on their essays if they want to be successful.

- 2. The schools you get into are not always indicative of one's intelligence or extracurricular strength. There are several applicants here whose ECs are certainly at the highest echelons yet were denied from "top" schools. Admissions is not a perfect process. In fact, it's far from it. While it may seem impossible for certain applicants to be rejected, or for results to be random, it's important to remember that this process is not a judgment on their or anyone's value or merit. It can be stressful, and it will surprise you, but it's never the end of the world.
- 3. Start early and take your time. Being strong on paper does not guarantee perfect results, and <u>taking</u> your time to craft strong essays and hone each aspect of your application is critical no matter who you are.
- 4. While it's easy to overlook financial aid when in the midst of applying, cost is often one of the single most important determining factors when deciding to attend. Be informed: not only about what need-based aid you might receive, but about what factors influence that aid, what strain certain cost levels would have on your family, and perhaps most importantly, about potential merit aid that might change your preferences altogether. 1k is actually a lot of money to owe. Sometimes, making the more financially sound choice is better than choosing a school because of prestige.

- 5. Love your safety. Statistically speaking, <u>not</u> <u>everyone can go to their dream school.</u> In addition to being realistic when choosing your safety in measures such as acceptance rate or middle 50, it's also important to keep in mind fit and cost.
- 6. There's a fine line between being confident and being unrealistic. Being honest with yourself and about your strengths will only help you to create the best possible applications that you can. this applies to both safeties and reaches!
