Breakout Group A:

Scope, Objective, and Functions of the Panel:

- * How can the panel ensure that its objectives align with the principles of intergenerational equity?
- * How can the panel integrate the proposals by the African Union and European Union to enhance its capacity-building function? (Towards Getting a text proposal for the capacity building function of the panel)

More Questions:

What are the key elements that should be included in the capacity-building function of the panel?

How can youth and children contribute meaningfully to capacity-building efforts within the panel?

What strategies can be employed to ensure that the panel's capacity-building initiatives reach a diverse audience, including marginalised communities?



Institutional Arrangements for the Panel:

- * What governing structures should be put in place to ensure effective functioning of the panel?
- * How can the panel establish strategic partnerships to enhance its institutional capacity and effectiveness?
- * What financial arrangements are necessary to sustain the panel's operations and initiatives in the long term?

Evaluation of Operational Effectiveness and Impact:

- * What metrics should be used to evaluate the operational effectiveness and impact of the panel?
- * How can the panel ensure that its activities lead to tangible outcomes in terms of chemical management, waste reduction, and pollution prevention?
- * What mechanisms should be established for regular evaluation and feedback from stakeholders, including youth and children?

- * How can the panel promote active engagement mechanisms for youth and children in its work?
- * What strategies can be implemented to foster collaboration and cooperation among panel members from diverse backgrounds and expertise?

Institutional Arrangements for the Panel:

- * How can the multidisciplinary youth experts advisory group be part of the work Programme of the panel?



Financial Arrangements:

- * What sources of funding should the panel explore to support its activities and initiatives?
- * How can the panel ensure equitable access to financial resources, particularly for youth-led projects and initiatives?
- * What mechanisms should be in place to ensure transparency and accountability in the management of financial resources?

Evaluation of Operational Effectiveness and Impact:

- * How can the panel measure the effectiveness of its operating principles in promoting youth and children's engagement?
- * What indicators should be used to assess the impact of the panel's activities on chemical management, waste reduction, and pollution prevention?
- * How can the panel incorporate feedback from youth and children in its evaluation processes to continuously improve its effectiveness?
