I am a San Francisco native and public school graduate who is ready to give back to his school district. My 7th grade algebra teacher encouraged me to do a state math contest, and I won first place. Thanks to my educators, I went to Lowell, Harvard, and Stanford and had a great career in biotech. I wish every young San Franciscan all the opportunities to be their best selves.

I was with the school board recalls from the first day and gathered hundreds of signatures. I brought back oversight to the \$744 million in SFUSD facilities bond funding spending and am now in my 2nd year of the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee pushing for greater transparency. I was with the teachers from the first night they did a sleepover to protest the terrible EmPower payroll software. I was with students when they rallied for student safety and more services for mental health.

All us candidates want to balance the budget and to improve student outcomes. Only I have the practical experience of looking through the meeting documents to find millions of dollars of wasteful consultant spending. Only I have been working with the district auditors for years. Only I have called for a full forensic audit of how money is being spent.

Of all the candidates, only I have been pushing to reduce chronic absenteeism. We can follow the lead of successful school districts throughout the state by reaching out and responding to families. I am the only candidate who has been working with folks in the bay area that have been bringing kids up to grade level in literacy. I am the only candidate working to save popular programs like language immersion.

Yes, absolutely. Young people are our future, and deserve a say in our public school system's progress. I remember being inspired to work in public service when I was a teen here.

- 7. Please share your top three priorities affecting San Francisco, why they are important, and how you plan to use your platform to advocate for them if elected.
  - 1) Student educational experience. We need to get our students reading and doing math at grade level. We can do this work by bringing kids back to the classroom, supporting their mental health support, and giving them proven curricula. I am the only one with the knowledge and network to have us make good progress in a year's time
  - 2) Averting a state takeover of the SFUSD school system. We absolutely can balance the SFUSD budget in a thoughtful way that avoids disparate impact. Some schools will need to close, but we will ensure that the process is as smooth as possible, and that Black and Latino families are not disproportionately impacted. I will analyze the data, and make sure that community input is truly incorporated.
  - 3) Bringing a culture of accountability and transparency. We have for too long put major concerns under the rug— from leaking roofs, to unsafe schools, to lead in the drinking water, to countless other examples. We have to be honest about past failures and publicly commit on ways to improve the lives of our students and educators. I have been doing this work for years on the CBOC.

8. What is your vision of how to best support students, educators, and staff?

We've got to bring improvements to the student experience—from being in school, to feeling safe, to having mental health support, to learning middle school algebra. The district has to work to make life easier for the principals and educators and the Commissioners can push that agenda from the top.

9. Students have advocated for significant investments and improvements to school resources, including, but not limited to: mental health services, school safety infrastructure, and academic support. How will you deliver on these priorities?

We absolutely must ensure that our schools are a safe environment where our students can learn and thrive. We must provide mental health support for struggling students – I myself received much needed support from my counselor Ms. Catelli in tenth grade, while my parents were going through a divorce. In order for our students to succeed, they need the right environment. I was with students when they rallied on a school day for better school safety and more mental health support. I will keep pushing for ways to increase staffing and resources to make progress in these areas.

10. Do you support school site closures? If so, please explain how you'll support affected communities during and after the closures.

School closures will unfortunately be necessary in order to balance the SFUSD budget and to avert a state takeover. I will be watching the dollars to see that we will do what is necessary and not bring any further unneeded pain. I will push for fuller transparency as many parents and educators are anxious and still in the dark. I will ensure that the community feedback process extends all the way to which schools close, how people will transition, and how we will go about growing student enrollment.

11. Disrupted by a pandemic and recalls, <u>SFUSD</u> and <u>CCSF</u> have been in fiscal crisis for years. If elected, how will you ensure SFUSD's/CCSF's financial security for the years to come?

It is true that the pandemic-era school closures adversely impacted our fiscal situation. We spent all the one time funds and did not get better outcomes for our students. I will bring the expense in line with the income and make sure the limited funds will be used wisely to support our students as much as possible. I will push for a smaller district administration and less expensive consultants. I have been

working for years to make the facilities department spend our limited bond money better by drilling down on where they have been overspending unwisely.

12. As of today, frictions and disagreements persist between SFUSD's/CCSF's administration and the Board. How will you work to improve collaboration with administration, while also fully holding them accountable for their actions?

I already know dozens of school administrators and district leaders, from advocating for various things over the years. I am always respectful and grateful for their service. And I also have been bringing good changes like in my work on CBOC. We always can begin with gratefulness and respect and get big things better for our students.

13. (SFUSD only) Lowell High School's merit-based admissions process has been under scrutiny for years, in addition to the lottery system as a whole for SFUSD schools. What is your vision on the best process for students going into high school? Do you believe in lottery, merit, or an alternative?

I believe in a merit-based system at Lowell High School, and advocated to restore it. Similarly, RASOTA's selective admissions should continue. We can put more effort to helping all students in middle school and have all high schools have centers of excellence, including in areas that will steer students to careers that don't need college.

#### HOUSING

14. California's Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) mandates that San Francisco construct 82,069 new residential units between 2023 and 2031. In 2023, SF approved 1,136 unit permits, falling far short of the 9,118/year needed to meet our housing goals.

1. What do you perceive to be a bottleneck to the permitting and construction process and what do you propose to accelerate our local permitting process for both affordable and market-rate projects? What are your thoughts on the recent implementation of <u>SB 423</u> (Wiener, 2023) in San Francisco?

I support less regulation and shorter review times as means to speed up and reduce the cost of building housing. As a real estate professional who has worked across the state and in other states, there are many models to follow. Wiener's legislation is a commendable addition.

2. Do you support ending the <u>RH-1 zoning designation</u> of single-family homes in favor of establishing sixplex multi-family residential buildings as the city-wide minimum residential density? Do you support the proposed <u>SF Housing Element plan</u> to increase housing density?

This topic is worthwhile considering and is outside my scope as a Board of Education Commissioner candidate.
