 - On This source is a website with a huge list of articles organized in a very simple way that will not have you lost. This is probably the largest source I used and had answers to most things in articles that explained it very well. They do the best job of going through the entire process and organizing it so you can read every single article and have a good understanding of most things. I used this source specifically for outlining the design process but came back to it for a wide variety of things.
