LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Colleges often require multiple letters of recommendation as part of their application. When asking for a letter of recommendation it is important to remember to:

- ask someone that knows you well.
- give the writer ample notice by asking a few weeks in advance.

DOES GPA MATTER?

There are many factors that go into a college's decisions on accepting applicants. While your GPA is a factor, it is certainly not the only one. Other things colleges look at are:

- volunteer and work experiences
- extracurricular activities
- rigor of coursework
- ACT/SAT scores
- paying attention to the detail of your application
- the content of the essay portion
- if the applicants filled out optional portions of the application
- letters of recommendation
- extenuating circumstances that may have influenced poor grades

COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMS

ACT

The ACT is a test published and administered by the American College Testing Service. It measures a student's aptitude in English, math, reading, and scientific reasoning. The ACT also has an optional writing portion which is required by some colleges. We recommend the ACT along with the writing. It is recommended for students who plan to enroll in a four-year college to take the ACT at the end of their junior year (April or June testing dates). The ACT is an assessment that is used by the colleges in the Midwest as part of their entrance requirements. Registration materials can be picked up at campus or online at www.actstudent.org. Wolf Creek School Code is: 241-342

Students can access FREE, online ACT practice tests through local libraries. The practice tests and other ACT preparation material is in the Learning Express database which can be found on any public Minnesota library website. A tutorial of how to access free, online practice ACT tests can be found here.

SAT

The SAT is a test published and administered by the College Board. It measures critical reading, math & writing abilities. We recommend that students check with their post-secondary institution to see if it is required. The test is usually used as an entrance requirement for post-secondary institutions not in the Midwest. Registration materials can be picked up in the guidance office or online at www.collegeboard.com

ACCUPLACER

The Accuplacer was developed by the College Board to provide information regarding the skill level of a student in the areas of reading, writing, English, and math. Most community and two-year colleges use this assessment as a placement tool to assist in selecting the most appropriate classes; contact the college of your choice for more information.



There is a lot to consider when choosing a college. Use the tools and resources below to help you find a college that has your program of interest, is affordable, and is a good fit for you.

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

As you look at different colleges, here some questions to ask to help you narrow down your choices and find the college that is best for you:

- Does the college offer my program of interest?
- Where is it located?

- What is the cost?
- Does the institution offer support to its students for finding employment?
- Is there an on-campus house option?
- What is student life like there? What clubs, organizations, and activities do they have for students to get involved in?
- How is my program of interest offered? Online? Full-time/ Part-time? Day courses? Evening courses?

Paying for College

FINANCIAL AID

With the <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u>, students can apply for Federal Student Aid to help pay for college. <u>Federal Student Aid comes in different forms</u> including grants (that <u>do not</u> have to be paid back), loans (that <u>do</u> have to be paid back), and work-study programs to cover or reduce some of a student's tuition. We will be hosting a FAFSA virtual workshop late October, 2020.

FAFSA Process

Step One: Creating an FSA ID

The first step in completing the FAFSA is creating an FSA ID. This will give you access to the Federal Student Aid's online system and will serve as your electronic signature. **Use this link to create your FSA ID**https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch. A parent or guardian will also need to create an FSA ID if you are a dependent student so they can electronically sign your application as well. Not sure if you are a dependent student? https://example.com/Here is a video that can help to determine your dependency status.

Tip: Use a personal email address when registering your FSA ID as you will need access to your email after you leave Wolf Creek.

You can use this document to save your FSA ID information.

Step Two: Completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

After creating an FSA ID, students can start their FAFSA at https://fafsa.gov/. To complete the application, students will need:

- Your Social Security Number
- Your Alien Registration Number (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Your federal income tax returns, W-2s, and other records of money earned. (**Note:** You may be able to transfer your federal tax return information into your FAFSA using the IRS Data Retrieval Tool.)

- Bank statements and records of investments (if applicable)
- Records of untaxed income (if applicable)
- An FSA ID to sign electronically.

Step Three: Student Aid Report

After completing the application, you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) which is a summary of the FAFSA data you submitted. It is important to look this over and make sure all of the information is correct. It may also include an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) number. This is not the amount of money your family is expected to pay. You may be responsible for less or more than this number. Colleges and career schools use this number to determine aid.

Step Four: Award Letter

Colleges and career schools that you have been accepted into are sent your information and will use it to calculate your aid. The school will then send you an Award Letter informing you of the aid you are eligible to receive. The timing of receiving this information varies from school to school. It could be the winter before you start or as late as immediately before you start school. It depends on when you apply and the school's preference for awarding aid. Contact your college or career school's financial aid office to get more information on when to expect to receive this information.
