NONDISCRIMINATION AND ACCESS TO EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY

The Board of Education is committed to providing an equal educational opportunity for all students in the District.

The Board does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation, sex, (including transgender status, change of sex or gender identity), or physical, mental, emotional, or learning disability ("Protected Classes") nor does it deny participation in, deny the benefits of, or be discriminate against in any curricular, extracurricular, public services, recreational, or other program or activity.

The Board is also committed to equal employment opportunity in its employment policies and practices as they relate to students. The Board's policies pertaining to employment practices can be found in <u>Policy 113</u> and <u>Rule 113</u>- Nondiscrimination in District Programs, Activities and Operations.

The Superintendent shall appoint and publicize the name of the compliance officer(s) who is/are responsible for coordinating the District's efforts to comply with the applicable Federal and State laws and regulations, including the District's duty to address in a prompt and equitable manner any inquiries or complaints regarding discrimination or equal access. This program shall include procedures for student placement, services, evaluation, and exit guidelines and shall be designed to provide students with effective instruction that leads to academic achievement and timely acquisition of proficiency in English. As a part of this program, the District will evaluate the progress of students in achieving English language proficiency in the areas of listening, speaking, reading and writing, on an annual basis (see AG 2260F).

Students, parents and all other members of the School District community are encouraged to promptly report suspected violations of this policy to a teacher or administrator. Any teacher or administrator who receives such a complaint shall file it with the District's Compliance Officer at his/her first opportunity.

Students who believe they have been denied equal access to District educational opportunities, in a manner inconsistent with this policy may initiate a complaint and the investigation process that is set forth below. Initiating a complaint will not adversely affect the complaining individual's participation in educational or extracurricular programs unless the complaining individual makes the complaint maliciously or with knowledge that it is false.

NONDISCRIMINATION BASED ON SEX UNDER FEDERAL TITLE IX

Consistent with the U.S. Department of Education's implementing regulations for Title IX, this policy does not apply to sexual harassment that occurs outside the geographic boundaries of the United States, even if the sexual harassment occurs in the district's education programs or activities. Sexual harassment that occurs outside the geographic boundaries of the United States is governed by the Student Code of Conduct if committed by a student, or by other applicable Board policies and administrative guidelines, applicable State and/or Federal laws and/or Employee/Administrator Handbook(s) if committed by a Board employee.

Complaints alleging sexual harassment and/or discrimination based on sex are also covered by and subject to the investigation procedures in Board Policy 5517 - Student Anti-Harassment. Complaints not covered by this policy may still be governed by and subject to the procedures in Policy 5517 - Student Anti-Harassment.

STUDENT SEARCHES, LOCKER SEARCHES, AND K9 UNITS

The district retains the right to conduct announced and unannounced locker searches under Wisconsin State Statute 118.325. Lockers are the property of the district and can be searched by school administration at any time for any reason. The district may conduct unannounced K9 sweeps of hallways, locker rooms and the parking lot.

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

School District Policy 431 on Attendance can be found on the district website and in the Student/Parent Handbook. State law requires the School District to enforce compulsory attendance of students.

DISTRICT INFECTIOUS DISEASE OUTBREAK READINESS PLAN

The district will take whatever measures necessary to identify, and contain, in cooperation with local, state, or national public health authorities, the further spread of outbreaks of infectious disease.

PROGRAMS FOR ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

Parents/guardians of limited English proficiency students are encouraged to contact their child's school principal for information including but not limited to a program for the child, the child's level of proficiency, academic achievement, methods of instruction, the child's educational needs, requirements, disability, and parental rights.

TITLE I PROGRAMS

Federal law requires that school districts share qualifications of teachers and paraprofessionals in schools that receive Title I funds. The School District of Shell Lake will receive Title I funds for the 2025-26 school year. As a parent of a student at the Shell Lake Elementary School, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teacher who will instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires the district to give you this information in a timely manner if requested. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

A. Whether the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.

- B. Whether the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- C. The teacher's college major, whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- D. The qualifications of any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals that provide direct services to your child.

ABUSE OF CHILDREN

SS 49.981 All school employees are required by law to report any abuse or neglect of a child or any suspected abuse or neglect of a child, to social services or law enforcement.

ACADEMIC AND CAREER PLANNING SERVICES FOR STUDENTS

Wisconsin Administrative Code PI 26.03(1)(b) 1

School districts are required to inform parents of what academic and career planning services their child receives and provide parents with opportunities to participate in their child's academic and career planning. Wisconsin DPI has chosen the Xello program and Shell Lake has adopted that program to track a student's academic/career pathway. Information on the program will be disseminated to parents and students as we transition into the new system.

EDUCATION FOR EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

School boards are required by PI26.03 to notify parents of the District's Education for Employment (E4E) program. Under Wisconsin Statutes 121.02(1)(m) and 115.28(59), school districts must provide all students access to an E4E program that provides students in grades 6-12 with information and opportunities that lead to career planning and preparation. STUDENT RECORDS ANNUAL NOTICE

The School District maintains student records for each student attending school in the District. These records include: (1) student progress records – courses taken, grades, immunization records, extracurricular activities and attendance; and (2) student behavioral records – psychological tests, personality evaluations, records of conversations, records relating specifically to an individual student's behavior, tests relating specifically to achievement or measurement of ability, physical health records other than immunization records, law enforcement agency records obtained by the District, and any other student records which are not progress records.

State and federal laws require that the maintenance of student records assure confidentiality. The District has adopted a student records policy and procedures. This notice is subject to state and federal laws and the District's policy and procedures. Accordingly, the following shall apply in the District:

- 1. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to inspect, review and obtain copies of the student's school records upon request in accordance with established District procedures. The District will respond to such requests without unnecessary delay. Copies of the District's student records procedures are available upon request at the School District Office, 271 Hwy 63; Shell Lake, WI 54871; Regular office hours are: 8:00 am to 4:00 pm.
- 2. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian of a minor student, has the right to request the amendment of the student's school records if he/she believes the records are inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. Complaints regarding the content of student records may be made in accordance with established District procedures. Copies of the District's procedures are available upon request as outlined above.
- 3. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to consent to the disclosure of information contained in the student's school records, except to the extent that state and federal laws authorize disclosure without consent. One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials determined to have legitimate educational or safety interests in the records. A "school official" is a person employed by the District who is

required by the Department of Public Instruction to hold a license; a law enforcement officer(s) who is individually designated by the School Board and assigned to the District; a person employed by or working on behalf of the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor or support staff member (including health or medical staff and police-school liaison personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a specific task (such as an attorney, hearing officer, auditor, medical consultant or therapist); or a person serving on an official committee such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his/her tasks. A school official has a "legitimate educational interest" if the official needs to review a student record in order to fulfill his/her professional or District responsibility.

The District also, upon request, forwards a student's records to another school without consent in accordance with state law for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer. District procedures outline the specific reasons for disclosure without consent and are available upon request as outlined above.

4. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education for alleged District noncompliance with federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) requirements. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA is: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20202-5920. See School Board Policy 347.

STUDENT DIRECTORY INFORMATION

While the school district must obtain and use certain information about each student in order to plan the best program possible, this need must be balanced with the right of each student and parent to privacy. Therefore, access to school information is limited and controlled. School District Policy 347.1 Student Directory Data identifies student data that may be shared and the process to opt-out.

NOTICE OF SUICIDE PREVENTION RESOURCES

According to section 115.365(3) of the state statutes, each school board must annually inform its professional staff of the resources available from the DPI and other sources regarding suicide prevention. Information describing the suicide prevention resources and services and how staff can access them, along with model notices, are available on DPI's website.

PARENT RIGHTS AND THE CURRICULUM

The Board recognizes that a course of study or certain instructional materials may contain content and/or activities that some parents find objectionable. If after careful, personal review of the program lessons and/or materials, a parent indicates to the school that either content or activities conflict with his/her religious beliefs or value system, the school will honor a written request for his/her child to be excused from specific sessions for specified reasons. The student, however, will not be excused from participating and completing the course or activities mandated by the State and will be provided alternative learning activities during these times of parent requested absences.

Requests regarding the above may be made to the building principal. All requests shall be judged individually, based upon state and federal guidelines. If a parent/guardian is not satisfied with the building principal's decision, he/she may appeal to the superintendent.

VIDEO SURVEILLANCE

In accordance with Board Policies 731.3 and 754, the Board of Education authorizes the use of video surveillance and electronic monitoring equipment at various school sites throughout the district and on school buses. Video surveillance is not constantly monitored.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Upon request, the School District of Shell Lake is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies,

and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Ms. Kristi Hoff, Director of Pupil Services, School District of Shell Lake, at 715-468-7816 or at hoffk@shelllake.k12.wi.us

CHILD FIND AND STUDENT SERVICES

The District must locate, identify, and evaluate all resident children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities. The school district has a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are residents of the District and who have not graduated from high school. Upon request, the District will screen any resident child who has not graduated from high school to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. ANNUAL NOTICE HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth as:

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:

- sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- living in emergency or transitional shelters
- abandoned in hospitals
- living in a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and
- migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the School District of Shell Lake provides the following assurances to parents and guardians of homeless children and youth and unaccompanied homeless youth:

- The child or youth shall be immediately enrolled and allowed to fully participate in school, even if unable to produce records normally required for enrollment (e.g., academic records, immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation) or has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
- Homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated because of their status as homeless and have full and equal educational and related opportunities.
- Meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children including special notices of events, parent-teacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.
- Immediate enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool.
- Written explanation of any decisions related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational
 agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the rights of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to
 appeal and receive prompt resolution of such decisions.

SCHOOL WELLNESS POLICY

School districts participating in federally subsidized child nutrition programs (e.g., National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, Special Milk Program and After-School Snack Program) were required to establish local school wellness policies by the beginning of the 2006/07 school year. CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAMS

The "National School Lunch Program" notice is sent to each parent at the beginning of the school year. The district follows the USDA Child Nutrition Reauthorization of 2010 and its inclusion in Local Wellness Policies.

EARLY COLLEGE CREDIT PROGRAM

The Board recognizes the value to students and to the district of students participating in programs offered by University of Wisconsin system institutions, tribally controlled colleges, and private, non-profit higher education institutions in Wisconsin. The Board will allow any high school student who satisfies the eligibility requirements to participate in the Early College Credit Program (ECCP) to enroll in an approved course at an ECCP-approved institution of higher education while attending in the district. Students will be eligible to receive college and high school credit for completing course(s) at authorized institutions of higher education provided they complete the course(s) and receive a passing grade. The School District's responsibility to pay for tuition, fees, books, and other necessary materials shall be limited to eighteen (18) postsecondary credits per student. The District Administrator shall establish administrative guidelines to ensure that the District's Early College Credit Program comports with applicable State law and the administrative rules of the Department of Public Instruction. The District Administrator shall also ensure that high school students and their parents are provided with information regarding the Program by October 1st each year.

RECRUITER ACCESS TO STUDENT RECORDS

Under the general provisions in Title IX of the recently reauthorized federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) also known as the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001, local education agencies receiving funds under this act shall provide armed forces recruiters access to students and student recruiting information. The School District of Shell Lake receives these funds. The following guidelines shall be followed for active recruitment of high school students by any branch of the Armed Forces in the School District of Shell Lake:

1. With approval of the principal, representatives of the Armed Forces may present information about the various branches to students in the district high schools. Military recruiters will have the same access to students on school grounds as post-secondary educational institutions.

- 2. Counselors may provide information related to the military as career information for students. Counselors may provide information related to alternatives to military service.
- 3. All military recruitment materials shall be appropriately labeled or identified.

The School District of Shell Lake shall provide, upon a request by military recruiters or an institution of higher education, access to high school student names, addresses, and telephone listings, referred to as directory data under s.118.125, Wis. Stat. A high school student or the parent of the student may request that this information not be released without written parental consent. The School District of Shell Lake is required to notify parents of this option and shall comply with any request.

Any student or parent of the student wishing to remove their names, addresses, and/or telephone numbers from access must submit in writing to the high school principal, such a request. This request will remain on file during the duration of the student's high school career.

This follows Section 9528 of the ESEA (20 U.S.C. Section 7908) as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (P.L. No. 107-110), education bill.

STUDENT PRIVACY

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA), 20 U.S.C. 1232h requires the School District of Shell Lake to notify you and obtain consent or allow you to opt your child out of participating in certain school activities. These activities include a student survey, analysis, or evaluation that concerns one or more of the following eight areas ("protected information surveys"): 1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; 2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family; 3. Sex behavior or attitudes; 4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior; 5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships; 6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers; 7. Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or 8. Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility. This requirement also applies to the collection, disclosure of use of student information for marketing purposes ("marketing surveys"), and certain physical exams and screenings. The School District of Shell Lake will provide parents, within a reasonable period prior to the administration of the surveys and activities, notification of the surveys and activities and be provided an opportunity to opt their child out, as well as an opportunity to review the surveys. (Please note that this notice and consent/opt-out transfers from parents to any student who is 18 years old or emancipated under state law.)
