Summary of Demands

Introduction

On September 9th, we graduate workers sent to university administrators one of many letters of concern about the university's inadequate response to our worsening research and teaching conditions. At that point, cross-departmental faculty and graduate student letters addressed to university administrators since the end of the spring semester had remained unanswered. We acknowledge that some of our concerns were addressed in Dean Alonso's letter on August 11th announcing policies to support PhD students in select departments. However, many pressing issues remain unresolved, leaving many academic workers across all schools and departments in precarious positions. We demand a unified response from the university administration to alleviate this precarity. By February 25, 2021, we urge the administration to notify upper year student workers about their funding status for the following academic year. This is the most time sensitive issue: our members will need to make decisions about jobs and post-doc positions around this time in the semester. We are committed to organizing academic workers throughout the University around these issues and toward a strike.

Extensions of Research and Teaching Appointments for Upper Year Students

The letter from <u>Dean Alonso on August 11th</u> guaranteed teaching appointments for sixth and seventh years for AY 2020-2021 as well as funding for sixth-year students for the next five academic years in GSAS. However, no similar funding appointments were guaranteed to seventh-year students. This means that current sixth-year students have no guarantees of university appointments or funding starting as early as next year and current 7th years have no guaranteed funding. Furthermore, this policy disadvantages students who were, are, or will be on external fellowships during their sixth year.

All student workers have been negatively impacted by this crisis, from the lack of access to critical research materials, to the need to take on caregiving roles due to social distancing regulations, not to mention the emotional toll of this prolonged period of uncertainty. The onus should not be on them to show how their research has been affected. As such, every student worker should be guaranteed an additional year of teaching/research appointments, on top of what has already been guaranteed by some schools, with full compensation, even if they have received external funding. Moreover, we ask that students currently in years seven and above be

eligible to apply for research and teaching positions such as the Core Curriculum and the Teaching Scholars' Program. Should the deadlines for applying to these positions pass before an agreement is reached, deadlines should be extended to accommodate current 7th-year students.

Furthermore, upper year students whose research and writing years were interrupted, or who are unable to conduct their research and writing in the coming year, should receive additional non-service dissertation completion fellowships so that they can complete their research in a timely fashion. Columbia should look to the example of Harvard University, who has created extending funding opportunities without service requirements. The disparity between Columbia's response and those of peer institutions puts us at a disadvantage in comparison to our peers.

Extension of August 11th letter aid to all PhD programs

As Dean Alonso's announcement on August 11th makes clear, the Covid-related support extended by the Graduate School of Arts & Sciences excludes PhD students outside the Humanities, Social Sciences, Mathematics, and Statistics. Among those currently ineligible for the recent aid are a considerable number of graduate students in GSAS-administered programs, including Biological Sciences, Chemistry, E3B, Physics, and Psychology. With the exception of GSAPP, no meaningful Covid-related relief has been offered to PhD students in Columbia's other graduate schools, such as CUMC, the Mailman School of Public Health, the Graduate School of Journalism, and the School of Social Work. The uneven rollout of GSAS-sponsored support clearly reveals the lack of parity among graduate programs at Columbia. Even among programs that have received support, no follow-up announcements have been made detailing what this support is specifically, including eligibility, terms of employment, and exact financial compensation, which continues to cause immense confusion among departments and across programs. We ask that the announced Covid-related support be extended to all PhD students at Columbia, regardless of department or school affiliation.

Healthcare

We ask that you allow students beyond their 7th year and recent graduates to stay on their current health insurance plan or to renegotiate and/or subsidize these plans so that those who have no other alternative and scant chance of employment can afford health insurance. We also ask that the university expand dependent coverage to all students, including those beyond their 7th year. Students in these later stages of the program are more likely to have dependents and are no better equipped to pay for their healthcare than students earlier in their programs. Such coverage is especially essential in the context of a pandemic. Brown, Harvard, UPenn, Stanford and Yale have already committed to provide research and teaching positions for recent graduates, and many have resolved healthcare issues as a part of these commitments.

Housing

Many Columbia students who have stayed in the city during the pandemic have faced continued uncertainty with regard to their housing. The existing plans for relief are welcome- for instance, the suspension of the cancellation fees for move-out dates between April and May 2021- but they do not go far enough. In support of the Columbia University Tenant's Association, we demand that UAH eliminate cancellation fees *for the duration of the pandemic*, making it possible for residents to break their lease at any time without being forced to pay the exorbitant \$1000

cancellation fee. We further demand that proration apply to student's rent no matter the date that they move out, and not just for move-out dates in April 2021, as is currently the case. Finally, we demand that eligibility for UAH be automatically extended to students for the duration of their enrollment at Columbia (currently students beyond their 7th year cannot request a housing extension, no matter the circumstances). In order to take advantage of the additional year of funding we call on Columbia to provide, many graduate workers will need extended housing eligibility as well.

Childcare

While we commend the additional childcare stipend that has been granted to GSAS graduate workers, this measure only benefits students up to their seventh year. The COVID-19 pandemic has only exacerbated the already precarious situation of parents, who have been deprived of access to childcare and/or access to a private workspace. Many parents who are now in their eighth year or beyond had been counting on finishing their dissertations this past academic year, and diminished resources for childcare this academic year may prevent them from completing their dissertations yet again.

We ask Columbia to recognize the particular burden facing parents and request that the same childcare stipend policy be applied to all of the University's graduate worker parents—not only the ones in GSAS or below 7th year—as they all face similar challenges.

We also ask that Columbia honor the demands in <u>the fall CPW petition</u> which asks the University to extend the emergency childcare benefit. Because the circumstances surrounding child care difficulties have not changed in any appreciable way, these demands are common sense.

M&F Fees

We request that the University eliminate Matriculation & Facilities fees for all students beyond their fifth year of funding. M&F fees should be waived beyond what has been guaranteed by 6th year teaching appointments and for students in schools or departments who do not cover M&F fees for advanced students. These fees are an unreasonable burden, especially seeing as most students are off campus and unlikely to use the university's facilities. Furthermore, in a climate in which many students beyond their funded years are struggling to locate fellowships or other sources of income in an increasingly competitive job and fellowship market, these fees force many students to choose between rent or registration, and between full-time work or dissertation progress. Ultimately these fees represent a major obstacle to timely degree completion.

Post-M.Phil. leave of absence

Doctoral students are usually prohibited from taking leaves of absence after securing the M.Phil en route to completing the Ph.D. However, some departments have allowed students to do precisely this in the Fall semester due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Unfortunately, crises that require a student to withdraw for a semester or two are just as likely to strike after the M.Phil as before. Therefore, we advocate that this become a permanent change. We also request that the University explicitly announce to all schools and departments the possibility of taking a post-M.Phil leave of absence.

<u>Improved communications</u>

We ask for both more transparency in the decision-making process as well as more streamlined, university-wide communications. Columbia should communicate policies as they are being developed, not just when they are implemented, and should send announcements to all students across all schools instead of leaving this to individual schools and department directors. Further, the University should solicit input from students who will be affected and answer letters from student groups. We also request more frequent town halls with all departments to discuss issues faced by graduate students collectively.

Conclusion

We reiterate our request for a unified response from the university administration to alleviate the precarity felt by many workers in our unit. We urge the administration to notify upper year student workers about their funding status for the following academic year by February 25, 2021.

Last March, our colleagues voted 1833 to 77 (96%) to authorize a strike to win a contract. We are committed to organizing academic workers throughout the University around these issues and toward a strike. Many peer institutions have already made more considerable efforts to alleviate the COVID-related concerns of their academic workers. Many of these concerns existed before the pandemic but have been sharply exacerbated by it. It is distressing that Columbia has not felt the same sense of urgency.
