There is general agreement by most that we want both prosperity and quality of life, and the accomplishments along this line over the last few years have been impressive by any standard. Clearly Happy Valley is a very attractive place to live. This document is a listing of programs, projects and organizations that support the quality of life in our region.

In late 2014, Transition Centre completed the Centre Sustainability Master Plan (CSMP) and were gratified to find that our region had an emerging sustainability culture. At that time, in partnership with others, we developed a list of organizations, programs and projects with an influence on livability in our region. Since then, a great deal of progress has been made by a large number of organizations to increase our capacity to meet the needs of our community in the future.

Happy Valley

Happy Valley is the name given to a place in Central Penn-sylvania more or less defined as State College, the site of the main campus of The Pennsylvania State University (Penn State), and home for approximately 130,000 people. It is part of a long valley in the Appalachian Ridge and Valley formation that runs along the edge of the Appalachian Plateau.



Happy Valley is a beautiful place to live and the home of a

thriving economy. In fact, the name "Happy Valley" came out of the 1930s during the Great Depression; the region has over the years been less affected by economic hardship due in large part to students attending Penn State.

Happy Valley is largely defined by a natural geological feature, the Spring Creek watershed. The Spring Creek Watershed Commission (link)² has sought to give further



definition to this region. Happy Valley can also be extended into Nittany Valley and Penns Creek to bring the total population to about 140,000³ over approximately 600 square miles.

The Spring Creek watershed is characterized by a karst geological formation that holds a lot of water and the fact that all of our water comes from the sky above. It is topographically distinguished by the hills that surround the watershed. This feature requires our attention to keep our water pure.

Mission: Ensure food grown and raised in central PA gets into the stomachs of those who live in central PA, with a focus on creating a more equitable food system starting with the farmer.

Vision: Phase One of this concept will initially focus on restaurants near State College who wish to buy meat and dairy from area farms. Subsequent phases will include a direct-to-consumer component, as well as selling products to schools, hospitals, retirement homes, and other institutions. Expansion of product line will include produce (both fresh and frozen), eggs, and poultry processing and sales.

Services:

Appalachian Food Works (AFW) operates as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization in the commonwealth of PA, and brokers, aggregates, packages, stores, and distributes locally grown and raised products to local markets (e.g., restaurants, stores, schools, institutions). For the purposes of our initial phase, we are defining "local" as Centre County and surrounding counties.

This food hub will work to maintain each farm's brand identity and assist with education and mentorship should a farm choose to diversify. Additionally, an effort will be made to increase food access in central PA to low-income and rural households. Furthermore, an agriculture and food business incubator will eventually be incorporated into the physical home for operations.

A Centre County farm sold, on average, \$89,422 of products in 2017. The economic impact of farming in Centre County, coupled with the continued loss of prime farmland, makes protecting and enforcing agricultural land protection essential for future generations.

The creation of the Centre County Agricultural Land Preservation Board in August 1989 signified the County's full-scale commitment to Pennsylvania's farmland preservation program. The Centre County Commissioners appointed nine members to the Board in accordance with the provisions contained within Agricultural Area Security Law, PA Act 43 as amended. Since that time, the Commissioners have continued to support the program by providing staff support and matching funds for the purchase of agricultural land conservation easements. To date, the county's agricultural land preservation program has preserved 56 farms in seven townships—bringing its total acreage for preserved farms to 8,300 acres.

- Administer a program for purchasing agricultural conservation easements in accordance with Act 43 of 1981 as amended and 7 Pa Code 138.
- Preserve the prime agricultural soils of Centre County by purchasing, in the name
 of the County, or jointly with a Local Government Unit and/or the Commonwealth,
 agricultural conservation easements within Agricultural Security Areas.
- Promote efforts to support the agricultural community in Centre County.
- Encourage the use of additional farmland preservation techniques through public and private organizations in Centre County.



There are numerous environmental, health, and economic benefits related to bicycling, especially as a substitute for driving a vehicle.

Environmental Benefits

The conversion of vehicular trips to cycling trips is an opportunity to reduce harmful greenhouse gas emissions, including carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, methane, nitrous oxide, and volatile organic compounds. The conversion of vehicular trips also reduces the pollutants and irritants that cause asthma, bronchitis, pneumonia, and decreased resistance to respiratory infections.

Health Benefits

Cycling also has the potential to positively impact personal health. Regular exercise reduces the risk of high blood pressure, heart attacks, and strokes and can help prevent other health problems such as non-insulin dependent diabetes, osteoarthritis, and osteoporosis. Exercise has also been shown to improve health by relieving symptoms of depression, anxiety, and stress.

Economic Benefits

Bike infrastructure and programs have been shown to deliver economic benefits to individuals and communities. Cycling can offer cost savings to individuals when used in place of private automobiles, and the increased physical activity from cycling can translate into health-related savings. Replacing even a small number of automobile trips with bicycle trips can create significant transportation related savings as a result of reduced vehicle traffic congestion, and increased cycling has also been tied to increases in commercial and residential property values and retail sales.

The University has also committed to a 20% reduction in building energy intensity by 2024 via the Department of Energy's Better Building Challenge.

In 2019, Penn State entered into a 25-year Solar PPA (Power Purchase Agreement) with Lightsource BP. This 70 MW project is a utility-scale ground mounted solar array, using over 150,000 solar panels sited on roughly 500 acres across 3 locations in Franklin County near Penn State's Mont Alto campus. It will provide 25% of Penn State's state-wide electricity requirements. The project is expected to be in service in July 2020.

Over the last 25 years Penn State has reduced its annual water use by 25%, while adding 10,000 students and 8M sq. ft. of building space. These reductions were achieved through conservation programs that installed low-flow fixture, and the reduction of potable water use in once-through cooling and process applications.

THE LIVING FILTER

Treated effluent from Penn State's wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) has been land-applied year-round at sprayfields since 1983 rather than stream-discharged. An estimated 90% of the irrigated water recharges the region's water table—about 1.7 MGD, over 500 million gallons per year. The land application of treated wastewater helps to maintain base flows in streams such as Spring Creek and reduces the impacts of drought conditions. Penn State's WWTP has not discharged to Thompson Run since 1983, and is thought to be one of the many reasons that the water quality of Spring Creek is considered to be better now than any time in the last 100 years. Oversight of the sprayfields operation is managed by the Waste Water Management Committee, a multi-disciplined committee made up of researchers from across the University. Research completed by this committee is transmitted via trade journals and research publications to advance the knowledge base on wastewater treatment plant and sprayfield operation.

In 2006, 135 acres of Rockview State Correctional Institution holdings outside the Spring Creek Canyon were transferred from Commonwealth ownership to the Centre County Industrial Development Corporation. This spurred local conservationists, government officials and landowners into action. Concerned with the potential for incompatible development and the loss of habitat and water quality, a coalition formed to advocate for the preservation of the canyon acreage owned by the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Benner Township, working with the ClearWater Conservancy, Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission, Pennsylvania Game Commission and The Pennsylvania State University, with funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the cooperation of the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections, produced the Spring Creek Canyon Conservation Strategy, a document intended to guide the future management and public use of the area. The plan proposed options for environmental and cultural preservation and education and for passive recreation. All that was needed to seal the deal was the land itself.

In 2010, House Bill 1890 authorized the conveyance of 1,827 acres of land to the agency partners to be preserved and maintained as the Spring Creek Canyon Cooperative Management Area. On September 30, 2011, about a month before my visit, a formal dedication ceremony opened the area to the public.

The acronym MS4 is short for a "Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System." From a practical perspective, it implies that a municipality, or municipal like entity, has a stormwater permit and is required by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PaDEP) and the US Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) to develop and implement a stormwater management program to reduce the contamination of stormwater runoff and prohibit illicit discharges.

The program must include six minimum control measures (MCMs) related to stormwater runoff; 1) Public Education and Outreach, 2) Public Involvement and Participation, 3) Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination, 4) Construction Site Runoff Control, 5) Post Construction Stormwater Management, and 6) Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping. Additional Information on these six MCMs can be found below under "permit requirements".

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Volunteer: Volunteering for events such as Earth Day or watershed cleanup events is a great way to do your part in helping out environment. If you would like to volunteer for an existing event, or develop a new one, contact your municipality or a group such as ClearWater Conservancy or Trout Unlimited.

Pick up Trash: Sometimes someone will inadvertently drop a piece of trash on the ground. If you see trash that you can safely pick up, collect it up and put it in the nearest garbage or recycling bin. It's that simple. If it's too large, or you think it may be hazardous, contact your municipality. Improperly controlled trash can enter the storm drain system, which then can reach a water body such as Spring Creek.

Never dump down drains: Our storm inlets lead to our creeks or stream carrying any pollutants and are not garbage receptacles. These untreated pollutants can kill fish and other aquatic life. Additionally, because we live in a karst environment, many storm inlets go directly to sinkholes or other recharge areas where pollutants can impair our groundwater.

Educate others: If you hear interesting facts that help our environment, spread the word around. Knowledge should be contagious.

Conserve Water: Enough said!

Car Care: Make sure your vehicle isn't leaking fluids and dispose fluids at a designated recycling point. Use a car wash that treats and recycles its water or wash your car on grass or gravel areas instead of pavement areas.

Lawn Care: Use fertilizers and pesticides sparingly as required, and don't forget to pick up pet waste. Lawns should be tested for nutrients to ensure the correct amount is applied, or if fertilizer is even needed.

Salt Usage: While we need to use salts on sidewalks and other impervious surfaces to prevent accidents, limit its use to only what's necessary and clean up excess spills immediately. When runoff occurs, the chlorides from the salts are washed into our waterways.

Giving: Contact your municipality to donate streamside buffer lands or easements to protect water quality for generations.

In the late 1960s, a broad group of concerned citizens saw the need for a federal-interstate coordinating agency to lead the conservation, development, and administration of the Susquehanna River Basin's resources that would preserve and enhance its value as a scenic and recreational asset for the people who live in the Basin. The need to coordinate these efforts, along with those of three states and the agencies of the federal government, led to the drafting of the Susquehanna River Basin Compact, which was signed on December 24, 1970. The Compact, as adopted by the Congress of the United States and the legislatures of New York State, Pennsylvania, and Maryland, provides the mechanism to guide the water resource management of the Basin. The Compact, which went into effect on January 23, 1971, also established the Susquehanna River Basin Commission as the agency to coordinate these water resource efforts.

Services:

Each member state/jurisdiction is represented by a commissioner who serves as the spokesperson for the government that he or she represents. In the case of the federal government, the commissioner has been identified in legislation as the Division Engineer, North Atlantic Division, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. For the three states, the commissioners are the governors or their designees. The commissioners also appoint alternate commissioners.

The commissioners, or their alternates, meet quarterly to act on a variety of programmatic and administrative matters, including applications for projects using

water; adopting regulations, policies and budgets; and enacting various planning and management activities. Each of the four commissioners has a single vote.

The commissioners, subject to the provisions of the Compact (Section 15.1(b)(3)), establish <u>Commission By-Laws</u> to govern its operation. Under the leadership of the Executive Director, technical and administrative personnel support the daily operations of the Commission.

About:

The Spring Creek Water Resource Monitoring Project (WRMP) was initiated in 1997 by the Spring Creek Watershed Association and housed at ClearWater Conservancy until 2019. Its goal is to gather baseline information about the quantity and quality of the water resources in the Spring Creek (PA) Watershed that can be used for the long-term protection of these resources as demands on them increase over time. The project has 15 surface water monitoring stations, 3 groundwater monitoring stations, and 8 spring monitoring stations. Over the years, the WRMP has provided a description of the quantity and quality of the surface waters of Spring Creek and its tributaries, provided a description of the quality of storm-water runoff throughout the watershed and monitored ground-water levels in critical areas.

Services:

The WRMP operates twelve stream monitoring stations with one site on the main stem of Spring Creek and twelve tributary sites located throughout the stream's five major sub-basins. The sites are representative of land use practices across the watershed. There are also three USGS-operated stream gages on the main stem of Spring Creek. The stations are equipped with instruments that continuously monitor water level, or stage, of the stream. Stream stage is digitally recorded every 30 minutes for all gaging stations except Lower Thompson Run and two stations on Walnut Run, where stream stage is recorded every 5 minutes due to rapid fluctuations in stage level during storm events. Rating curves are developed and maintained at each of these sites to convert stream stage into discharge rates. (2019 Discharge Data)

Moreover, there is growing recognition of the direct economic benefits to the region from tourism and recreation giving even greater impetus to restoration projects.

As part of a grassroots effort, approximately <u>sixty groups</u> consisting of watershed associations, Trout Unlimited chapters, conservation districts, municipalities and local businesses have come together to form the West Branch Susquehanna Restoration Coalition (WBSRC).
