Relationship vs. Acknowledgment: The Difference Between Knowing *About* God and Knowing God

This world is full of people who know *about* God.

They know Bible verses.

They know church traditions.

They know Christian language.

But knowing *about* God is like knowing about sunlight without ever stepping into it.

Jesus never called people to knowledge alone.
