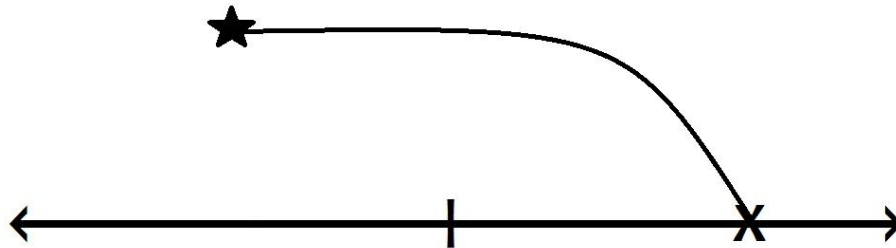


- Future Simple with 'Going to'
 - Functions
 - Used to speak about pre-made plans.
 - I am going to cook tonight.
 - Used to speak about predictions with evidence.
 - It looks like it is going to rain.

Future Simple with "going to"



- Structure
 - Regular
 - Subject + "To be" in the Present Form + Going to + Bare Infinitive
 - I am going to make pizza
 - You are going to play football
 - He is going to see a film
 - She is going to run home
 - It is going to eat carrots
 - We are going to be late
 - They are going to come later
 - Contractions
 - I am = I'm
 - I'm going to make pizza
 - You are = You're
 - You're going to play football
 - He is = He's
 - He's going to see a film
 - She is = She's
 - She's going to run home
 - It is = It's
 - It's going to eat carrots
 - We are = We're
 - We're going to be late
 - They are = They're
 - They're going to come later
 - Question

- “To be” in the Present Form + Subject + Going to + Bare Infinitive
 - Am I going to make pizza?
 - Are you going to play football?
 - Is he going to see a film?
 - Is she going to run home?
 - Is it going to eat carrots?
 - Are we going to be late?
 - Are they going to come later?
- Negative
 - Subject + “To be” in the Present Form + Not + Going to + Bare Infinitive
 - I am not going to make pizza
 - You are not going to play football
 - He is not going to see a film
 - She is not going to run home
 - It is not going to eat carrots
 - We are not going to be late
 - They are not going to come later
 - Contractions
 - I am not = I’m not
 - I’m going to make pizza
 - You are not = You’re not
 - You’re not going to play football
 - He is not = He’s not
 - He’s not going to see a film
 - She is not = She’s not
 - She’s not going to run home
 - It is not = It’s not
 - It’s not going to eat carrots
 - We are not = We’re not
 - We’re not going to be late
 - They are not = They’re not
 - They’re not going to come later

Important to remember

Subject + ‘To be’ in the Present Form form a contraction.

- I am = I'm.
- You are = You're.
- He/She/It is = He's/She's/It's.
- We are = We're.
- They are = They're.

Native speakers often shorten 'Going to' to 'Gonna/Gonna'. This is used for informal speech.

- Example = I am going to take a shower.
- Example = I'm gonna take a shower.
