# Buying and Selling a Vehicle

Help consumers steer clear of motor vehicle fraud by helping citizens recognize fraudulent activity. Motor vehicle fraud occurs when someone purchases a used vehicle and is misled about the car. Whether a seller withholds information about the vehicle's history or tampers with a VIN or license plates, it's important that customers understand their options and solutions.

# Consumers should:

- Check the title carefully: Ensure the seller is the registered owner on the title, and that there are no discrepancies with the VIN.
- Verify seller identity: Ask for a driver's license and other forms of identification to verify the seller's legitimacy.
- Run a vehicle history report: Use a reputable service to check for any issues with the car's history, including potential title problems
- Report suspicious activity: If you suspect fraud, report the seller to the platform where you found the listing and contact local authorities.

# Sellers should:

- Provide the Colorado Certificate of Title.
- **Keep the license plates.** These should be removed from the vehicle.
- Provide an emissions inspection certificate. This is only required if the buyer lives in an emissions area.



Be aware of Motor Vehicle Fraud when buying or selling a vehicle! Falling victim to fraud can happen to anyone. Always be on the lookout for the following:



- Damaged or salvaged titles
- Stolen or fraudulent plates
- Odometer fraud

Steer clear of Motor Vehicle fraud when buying a vehicle! Follow these steps:

Selling a car? Make sure that you know your responsibilities:

- Provide the Colorado Certificate Title
- The seller keeps the license plates. These should be removed from the vehicle.

# **Scam Text Messages**

Scammers have frequently been impersonating the DMV, falsely claiming recipients have unpaid tickets and threatening severe consequences such as prosecution, suspension of vehicle registration, and revocation of driving privileges. These deceptive text messages are crafted to appear as official communications from the Colorado DMV. Their primary goal is to frighten recipients into clicking on malicious links and divulging personal or financial information under the guise of settling non-existent violations.

These claims are entirely false and designed to intimidate individuals into immediate compliance, and all Coloradans must understand that these messages are <u>NOT</u> from the Colorado DMV. The DMV does not initiate contact via unsolicited text messages to demand payment for tickets or to threaten prosecution or suspension of privileges in this manner.



# Social Media Posts

The Colorado Division of Motor Vehicles will **NEVER** send you a text asking for money or threatening fines.

If you receive a suspicious text message claiming to be from the DMV:

- <u>Do NOT</u> click on any links. These links often lead to fake websites designed to steal your information.
- <u>Do NOT</u> share any personal or financial information. This includes your driver's license number, Social Security number, credit card details, or banking information.
- <u>Do NOT</u> reply to the text message.

Stay alert! Don't fall for a fraudulent text!

While the exact wording can vary, these fraudulent texts typically:

- State they are from the "Colorado DMV" or a similar official-sounding entity.
- Allege outstanding unpaid tickets or violations.
- Threaten imminent legal action, such as prosecution.
- Warn of pending suspension of vehicle registration and/or driving privileges.
- Contain a link to a fake website to "resolve" the issue or make a payment.

Received a fraudulent text? We encourage you to report it to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at <a href="www.ic3.gov">www.ic3.gov</a> or the Federal Trade Commission at <a href="reportfraud.ftc.gov">reportfraud.ftc.gov</a>. Be sure to include the phone number or email that sent the message and the website linked in the text.



# **Personal Identity Theft**

Each year, millions of Americans fall victim to scams perpetrated from all over the globe. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) estimates that, last year alone, more than \$1.7 billion was lost due to fraudulent activity. While exact figures are not available, it is also estimated that fraud losses total in the hundreds of millions of dollars in Colorado alone.

Consumer education is the best weapon in the fight against fraud; therefore, being knowledgeable of the tactics used by scammers will greatly reduce the chances of becoming a victim.

# How identity theft occurs:

- Scammers send fake emails (phishing), text messages (smishing), or make phone calls (vishing) pretending to be from legitimate companies to trick you into revealing personal information.
- Data breaches
- Malware
- Physical theft

# Five tips to avoid becoming a victim:

- Individuals should only carry necessary items in their purse or wallet.
- Shred all bills and records that are no longer needed that contain personal identifying information.
- Check Social Security records for unexplained earnings.
- Review their credit report for inconsistencies.
- Report lost or stolen documents.

# What is identity theft?

When identity thieves steal or obtain Social Security cards and numbers, birth certificates, immigration documents, or other personal information that is unique to you. The thief can use this information to:

- Obtain a driver license or ID card.
- Open a bank account or credit card in your name.
- Purchase an automobile or real estate.
- Drain personal financial accounts.

# Ways to avoid becoming a victim of identity theft, Part 1:

- Carry only those items needed in your purse or wallet. Avoid carrying your Social Security card, birth certificate, blank checks, numerous credit cards, or a motor vehicle title.
- Check your driving record on an annual basis online at <a href="https://dmv.colorado.gov/">https://dmv.colorado.gov/</a>
- Shred all bills and records you no longer need that contain personal identifying information.
- Check your Social Security records for unexplained earnings.
- Review your credit report for inconsistencies.



# Ways to avoid becoming a victim of identity theft, Part 2:

- Report lost or stolen documents, such as a driver's license, ID card, or vehicle titles, to law enforcement officials.
- Place fraud alerts on your credit file to warn creditors not to open a new account until they contact you.
- Only shop on secure, well-known websites.
- Create strong passwords for websites.
- Never provide personal information over the phone.

If you believe Personal Identifiable Information has been compromised, the Colorado Motor Vehicle Investigations Unit has an investigative team that may be able to assist you with clearing your driving record and determining proper ownership of vehicles. # Lost or stolen IDs

When an individual's ID is lost or stolen, it can be a stressful experience, but replacing a Colorado driver's license, ID card, or instruction permit is a straightforward process.

# Checking the Status of the ID:

• If one did not receive their ID from the DMV within 30 days of issuance, check the status of the card on myDMV.colorado.gov.

# Getting a Replacement:

• If a person's credential is **lost, stolen, or destroyed**, they can obtain a duplicate for a fee. However, if they do not receive their new credential in the mail, they may be eligible for a free duplicate. **To qualify, they must visit a state Driver License Office between 30 and 90 days after the original issue date.** 

# **Reporting Theft:**

• If an individual believes their driver's license or ID was stolen, they should file a report with their <u>local law</u> <u>enforcement agency.</u>

If a person suspects their ID number is being misused, they should request a new one. They must complete the following steps and bring the documents to a Driver License office **in person** (documents should not be mailed, emailed, or faxed):

- File a police report with their <u>local law enforcement agency.</u>
- Download and complete the <u>Affidavit of Colorado Driver License or Identity Theft</u> (DR 2153 Form).
- Have their signature on the form notarized.
- Bring these documents to any <u>Colorado Driver License office</u>. These documents cannot be mailed, emailed, or faxed to the DMV.

- You may qualify for a duplicate license or ID for a fee. To get a duplicate of your stolen credential, you will need to visit a driver license office. https://dmv.colorado.gov/AppointmentScheduling
- When scheduling your visit, you should select "Renew Colorado License/Identification card" as your appointment type.



# Lost your wallet?

3 easy steps to replace your state ID



Check to see if you qualify for a duplicate license. A duplicate credential is a copy of your license, so it will have the same expiration date, class and endorsements as your previous credential.



Make an appointment online to visit a driver license office.
https://dmv.colorado.gov/AppointmentSch eduling. When you schedule your visit, select "renew Colorado License/Identification card" as your appointment type



Go to the DMV.





# Lost Your ID?

To get a duplicate of your lost, stolen, or destroyed credential, visit a driver license office. Schedule an appointment at <a href="https://dmv.colorado.gov/AppointmentScheduling.">https://dmv.colorado.gov/AppointmentScheduling.</a>

# The Importance of Removing Plates when Selling a Car

Sellers should always remove their license plates to avoid liability for future accidents, tolls, and crimes committed with the vehicle, as plates are tied to the registered owner. Leaving plates on the sold vehicle links it to the seller, allowing the seller to receive unexpected bills and potentially be investigated if the vehicle is used in a crime.

As long as sellers handle selling a car the way it's advised, for example, by retaining their plates, filling out the Report Release of Liability, and completing a Bill of Sale, they'll save themselves from potential trouble in the future. If sellers have any questions about selling a car, refer to the <u>Colorado DMV website</u>.

What are the steps someone should take before selling their car, either to a private party, a dealership, or a junkyard?

It is the seller's responsibility to provide the Colorado Certificate of Title, remove the license plates from
the vehicle, complete an odometer disclosure statement, and, if required, provide an <u>emissions</u>
<u>inspection certificate</u>. If one is purchasing a vehicle from or selling a vehicle to another private party,
the buyer needs a Bill of Sale. For more information on buying and selling a vehicle, please refer to the

# How should someone dispose of old license plates?

 Regular plates should be returned to the nearest <u>county motor vehicle office</u> or recycled with a recycling service that will take metal. Sellers with personalized plates may transfer their old plates to their next vehicle through their county motor vehicle office.



# Selling your car? Follow these steps:

• It is the seller's responsibility to provide the Colorado Certificate of Title, remove the license plates from the vehicle, complete an odometer disclosure statement, and, if required, provide an emissions inspection certificate. If one is purchasing a vehicle from or selling a vehicle to another private party, the buyer needs a Bill of Sale. # Ensure that you don't have any liability towards your sold car!

Sellers should remove the license plates from the car and fill out a state Report Release of
Liability to voluntarily disclose an ownership transfer. Find the report on the following site:

 The release serves to remove the seller's liability for the
buyer's actions involving the vehicle after the sale is complete. Information entered into this
system is available to law enforcement agencies.

# Selling your car and no longer need your plates? Dispose of your plates the correct way!

Regular plates should be returned to the nearest county motor vehicle office or recycled with
a recycling service that will take metal. Sellers with personalized plates may transfer their old
plates to their next vehicle through their county motor vehicle office. Find your local county motor

# **Fake Emissions Tests**

Many Coloradans need a passing emissions test to register a vehicle. However, if a fraudster fails their emissions test, they might purchase a fraudulent passing test online through a counterfeit website and take it to the county DMV to register their vehicle. When a customer passes an emissions test, it electronically sends a message to DRIVES.

# Employees should be on the look out for:

- If the passing test is not in the DRIVES record and/or associated with the VIN of the vehicle.
- Any anomalies such as the font being inconsistent on the form.
- If the test numbers, VIN, or other vehicle identifying information appears to have been manipulated or altered.

If DMV employees do not see a passing test or suspect a test is fake, the employee should turn away the customer and tell them to get retested through AirCare Colorado.

# Help reduce vehicle pollution for a cleaner, healthier, and safer Colorado For All!





Always make sure that you're getting your emissions test from a legitimate emissions testing company!

The Air Care Colorado Inspection and Maintenance (I/M) Program is a network of 18 vehicle emissions testing stations conveniently located throughout the Denver metropolitan and North Front Range areas. Additionally, 18 RapidScreen roadside emissions testing units are rotated among state-approved locations throughout the program area.

Help reduce harmful air pollution!

Get your emissions test to reduce harmful air pollution, protect public health from respiratory issues and other ailments, and combat climate change by limiting greenhouse gases.

Emissions tests also help ensure that vehicles are operating correctly by checking the onboard diagnostic (OBD) system, promoting overall vehicle safety and proper maintenance.



# **Fake Government Websites**

Customers should always be on the lookout for websites that are not affiliated with the Colorado DMV but provide DMV services to consumers. Look for sponsored advertisements and disclaimers at the top or bottom of the site that says they are not affiliated with any government agency.

Always use the direct website, dmv.colorado.gov, when conducting DMV business.
