About Teach For America Ignite

Teach For America Ignite is a national tutoring corps designed to accelerate learning and foster belonging with students. Ignite builds on Teach For America's over 30 years of experience recruiting and developing leaders to partner with schools across the country to help students overcome the systemic barriers to an excellent education. Leveraging research-based best practices for high-impact tutoring, the Ignite Fellowship brings exceptional leaders into classrooms virtually to immediately add value with students and schools through customized learning.

Details about TFA Ignite:

As an Ignite fellow, you will:

- Lead small group, virtual learning experiences with students
- Be supported by a school-based, veteran educator
- Work approximately 3 5 hours per week during regular K-12 school hours
- Be able to explore available schedules and sign up for one that works for you
 - o Times are based on partner school schedules and sign-ups are first come first served. Not all accepted fellows will be able to find a time that works with their schedule the first semester, but may defer to join in a future semester.
 - o We partner with schools across the country in 5 time zones. You will sign up for a schedule that will remain consistent for the semester. <u>View a sample weekly schedule</u>.
- Earn a financial award at the end of each semester, ranging from \$800 \$1,200 in the fall and \$1,000 \$1,400 in the spring

These are the factors that most often attract people to TFA Ignite:

- Opportunity to Work with Kids: This was by far the most frequently mentioned aspect that attracted fellows to Ignite. Many see Ignite as a valuable opportunity to engage with and mentor young students.
- Paid and Virtual: Applicants value the financial award as well as the convenience and accessibility provided by a virtual teaching environment.
- Educational Engagement and Mentorship: Fellows' desire to engage in educational
 activities and mentorship. Fellows are motivated to contribute positively to the
 educational experiences of children, particularly in a flexible, online setting that fits
 with their schedules and commitments.
- *Professional Development*: Fellows enjoy gaining work experience, developing teaching skills, and connecting with Teach For America staff and other educators

Eligibility Requirements to Join TFA Ignite

- Be available to work for ~5 hours each week of the Fellowship
 - o Weeks 1 & 2: ~5 hours of learning and onboarding each week
 - o Weeks 3-4: ~2-3 hours working directly with students and ~2 hours preparing for sessions and learning each week
 - o You will sign up for a consistent schedule to lead tutoring for the semester
 - o Sessions are conducted virtually only
- Be at least one or more of the following:
 - o A current undergraduate or graduate student during the fall 2025 semester (both full- time or part-time students are eligible)
 - o Accepted to the TFA corps
 - o A renewing Ignite fellow
 - o An Ignite deferral from 2024-25
 - o TFA corps alum
- Have an undergraduate GPA of at least a 2.5 on a 4.0 scale (First year college students must have a high school GPA of 3.0+)
- Be at least 18 years of age
- Be authorized to work in the U.S. either U.S. citizens, national or legal permanent residents, Deferred Action For Childhood Arrivals/DACA recipients, or hold a valid EAD (<u>See our eligible EAD categories here</u>). Individuals in the U.S. on a student visa, exchange visa, work visa, or tourist visa are not eligible.
- Complete an online background check as a part of onboarding if accepted

Note: *When completing your eligibility profile on the Ignite application page, please carefully and accurately select your responses. If you see the notice "no programs available" it means you are ineligible based on what your responses to the eligibility questions. If you believe you are receiving this message in error, please email ignite@teachforamerica.org for technical support.

The Ideal Candidate for TFA Ignite

The qualities the Ignite Team looks for are:

- Desire to work alongside K-12 students to positively impact their learning, growth and sense of belonging
- Deep belief in kids and families facing systemic barriers
- Bold vision setting and the ability to create meaningful change
- Effective collaboration with people from different backgrounds and perspectives
- Desire to learn from people, experiences, and self-reflection
- Commitment to complete the entire semester of the Ignite Fellowship

Brainstorming: Consider Your Own Leadership

For our next section, we like to remind applicants of the S.T.A.R. Method when responding to describe a specific situation, task, action, and result.

- S Situation: Describe the situation that you were in or what you needed to accomplish. Be specific and detailed. Give your audience background and provide context.
- T Task: Describe the challenges and expectations. What needed to be done and what goal were you working toward? Why?
- A Action: What actions did you take to address the situation? Why? (Keep the focus on you.)
- R Results: Explain the result, accomplishment, recognition, savings, etc. (Be as quantitative as you can.) What was the outcome? How did the event end? What did you accomplish? What did you learn?

The Teach For America network imagines bold possibilities and achieves extraordinary results with students. In the next question, we are hoping to learn more about how you set goals for yourself or on a team, work towards those goals, and achieve them. Ignite Commitment Questionnaire Section

In the application portal, you'll be asked a series of questions regarding your understanding of the commitment to the fellowship if selected. Here is a preview of what that will look like:

If accepted as a fellow, you will be given the opportunity to select a consistent tutoring schedule of days and times that work for you during the Sign-Up Window in January.

At this time, please just confirm you are available to meet the basic program requirements outlined below:

- 1) I am available to work virtually for ~5 hours each week of Ignite.
 - a) Onboarding Weeks: ~5 hours of learning and onboarding each week
 - b) Fellowship Weeks: ~ 3 hours working directly with students and ~2 hours preparing for sessions and learning each week.
