AMD Website Evaluation Checklist

Every Time you use the WWW for research, you **MUST** consider if the site you are choosing is **RELIABLE** (trustworthy) or **UNRELIABLE** (not trustworthy). Evaluate a source based on the following criteria:



Use these questions to help you think about how to measure each of the criteria.

Category	Questions to ask yourself	YES OR NO
Timeli- ness	 Is the information current (recent)? Has the website been updated recently? Is it current enough for your topic? 	YES NO YES NO YES NO
Reliability	 Is the content of the resource primarily fact without presenting opinions? Does the creator provide references or sources for data or quotations? 	YES NO
Authority and Accuracy	 Does this page identify the author? Is there a biography of the author? Is the author qualified to write about the topic? Does the page identify a group or academic institution with which the author is associated? Is there contact information (email or address)? Can the information on this page can be found in at least two other unrelated sites or unrelated print resources? Is the page is free of spelling errors? Is the page is well organized? Are the graphics are high quality? 	YES NOYES NO
Purpose/ Point of View	 Does the site present factual information without trying to sway the audience's opinion? Is the page free of advertising? Is the domain of the .edu, .gov or, .org? 	YES NO YES NO YES NO
