Benefits

Through consistent and engaged participation, you can expect to accrue the following benefits:

- A strong grounding in R basics
- The opportunity to create an R module that will directly support your classroom instruction and/or your education research goals, as a part of a dedicated small group learning community
- Community support in your learning process, from both peers and the grant steering committee
- The chance to serve the broader biology education community through the distribution of any modules created
- The chance to become a future leader in the REAL network as it expands and we propose a full-scale Research Coordination Network to NSF
- A \$1,250 stipend upon completion
- Letter of completion explaining the course and learning community, as a potential resource for annual reviews or similar
- QUBES / CourseSource publication support

Expectations

In order to attain the benefits listed above, our expectations for participants are:

- Attend at least 6 of the 8 weekly 1 hour short course sessions
- Complete prep work before all of the 8 weekly short course sessions (intended to require <2 hours per week)
- Attend at least 75% of meetings for your small group learning community, and make good faith contributions to the module design and development process
- Actively support your fellow participants in their learning processes

• Maintain active lines of communication with the grant steering committee through the end of the project
