Introduction

The introduction in a scientific article should provide a general overview of the background to the problem under study. This section begins by describing the context or phenomenon that forms the basis for the research, as well as explaining its urgency in the field under study.

The research problem must be clearly articulated and supported by empirical evidence, such as data, facts, statistics, tables, or graphs, to prove that the problem genuinely exists. The author also needs to identify the problem formulation that will be answered through the research by asking key questions relevant to the topic.

Furthermore, the introduction must review previous literature by citing a minimum of 5 recent and highly relevant studies. This literature review is essential to establish a clear research gap, demonstrating how this study differs from existing work. Finally, the purpose of the research must be clearly explained, highlighting its importance in filling knowledge gaps or providing practical solutions.

Theoretical Framework

The theoretical framework section establishes the conceptual foundation of your research by introducing, explaining, and synthesizing the core theories or models that guide your study. Furthermore, you need to justify *why* these specific frameworks

are relevant to your research questions and demonstrate how they connect your study to existing scholarly literature.

In this section, the author must explain the type of research conducted, whether it is qualitative, quantitative, or a mixed method. Furthermore, the author needs to explain the data collection techniques used, such as interviews, surveys, observations, or experiments.

The number and characteristics of the samples used must also be explained, including how the samples were selected (for example, through random or purposive sampling). After that, the author needs to explain the data analysis method applied to process the information that has been collected, as well as the reason why this method was chosen to analyze the data according to the research objectives.

Result & Discussion

1. Research Result

The research results section presents the main findings of the research objectively and based on the data that has been collected. In this section, the writer must explain the research results in detail, whether in the form of narratives, tables, graphs, or images, according to the type of data obtained. All findings must be presented clearly and logically, leading to a better understanding of the problem under study. The research results must show the relationship or pattern found in the data, as well as explain how the data answers the research questions that were asked at the beginning. The author also needs to show the relevance of these findings to the existing hypothesis or research questions.

2. Discussion

Discussion is the part that interprets the research results. Here, the author explains and analyzes the research findings, and compares them with relevant theories and previous research. The author must relate the research results to the theoretical framework previously explained, explaining how these results support or contradict existing theories or studies. In addition, the author must also suggest an explanation for unexpected results or results that contradict existing theory, as well as consider factors that may influence the research findings. The discussion can also include the implications of the research results for practice, policy, or further theory development.

Conclusion

Conclusion is the part that summarizes all research findings and provides answers to the formulated problem. This section should contain a summary of the research results, explain what has been found, and how the results answer the questions or hypotheses posed at the beginning. The author should also emphasize the contribution of the research to the development of relevant knowledge or practice. In addition, the conclusion can also include suggestions for further research or practical recommendations resulting from research findings. These suggestions can be steps that need to be taken based on research results, or ideas for future research that can deepen understanding of the topic under study.
