Key Philosophy	Accommodation – accept segregation & the fact that whites will make it hard for you to vote;	Activism – fight directly against racism and inequality.
Education Focus	Industrial/vocational training (Tuskegee Institute).	University education to create future leaders

Long-term Goal	Economic progress  → gradual acceptance & eventual rights.	Political, social, and economic equality right away.
Organization	Tuskegee Institute	Co-founder of NAACP (1909).

## **Relationship With White People**

	Booker T. Washington	W.E.B. DuBois
Relationship with Whites	Cooperative with white leaders and politicians to gain gradual economic support.	Critical of white racism; pushed for organized resistance. Ex. Joining NAACP, marching in protests, or challenge unfair laws in court, = organized resistance.

#### In summary:

- ★ Washington = Gradual change, patience, vocational skills (hands-on job skill) first (accomodation)
- ★ Du Bois = Immediate equality, higher education, leadership and fight for equal rights for African Americans.(activism)
