

What does Year 11 look like in Fine Art?

What will be submitted and graded in the Final GCSE?

Unit 1: Otherwise known as coursework. 60% of the final grade.

Consists of two projects, Identity and the Mock Exam project.

The Identity project can be a smaller unit of work, loosely based around the theme and showing your ability across the 4 assessment objectives.

The Mock exam unit should be much more extensive, exploring multiple ideas, experimenting and refining ideas to a final outcome.

Unit 2: Externally Set Task. 40% of the final grade.

This unit gives you a choice between 7 different starting points set by AQA. This project should be in a new sketchbook and explore ideas and techniques linked to researched artistic influences. The same format as your mock exam unit.

How much homework should I be doing?

You should be aiming for a minimum of an hour a week outside of lessons. This will be either a teacher-set task or will be independent working. Use the R/A/G checklist to help you decide what to do in your independent work. You will receive regular DIRT comments from your teacher which will also help you to set yourself targets in your homework.

Term 1: Coursework Portfolio (Part of Unit 1 – Mock Exam)

You will continue to work on your personal investigation (mock exam) unit that will include your own drawings, photographs, Artist analysis and studies, various media, style and technique developments towards a personal response. This will become your main unit for your coursework (unit 1) submission. You will create a final piece for this unit just before Christmas.

Term 2: Externally Set Task (Unit 2)

You will begin work on your externally set task (Exam unit 2) unit that will include your own drawings, photographs, Artist analysis and studies, various media, style and technique developments towards a personal response in a two-day exam. You will have approximately 12 weeks on this unit.

Term 3: Coursework Portfolio (Unit 1) - 3 – 4 weeks only

You will have a few weeks to go back to your unit 1 projects (Identity and Mock exam) and refine/complete the projects and final pieces already created.

You will then organise and submit your two units for assessment in May.

Project review

Assessment Objectives	
AO1 - Developing ideas linked to contextual sources Initial response to theme - concept map or collage page of related images. Research pages, minimum of three Artists. Annotated images of their work, own thoughts and opinions about content, style, meaning and technique. To include transcriptions, experimenting with their style, use of media, working methods, content.	AO2 - Experimenting, developing and refining A development of art techniques using a range of media. Consider the formal elements - line, tone, colour, shape, form, texture and pattern. These should show influence from your artist. 3 Design ideas showing development and refinement towards a final piece.
AO3 - Recording observations and ideas Evaluate your ideas and images through annotations, referring to the techniques you have used, how your ideas relate to the theme and how your chosen artists have inspired you. A range of detailed observational drawings, full of detail Your own photographs to further influence your project and show a personal visual response. ANNOTATIONS

As a general rule, always try to say:

- **WHAT** you have looked at
- **WHO** made it
- **WHEN** it was made
- **WHY** it is inspiring to you
- **HOW** it will effect your own work

When talking about your own work, try to say:

- **WHAT** you have done
- **HOW** have you done it
- **WHAT** inspired you
- **WHAT** else did you try
- **WHY** is it successful
- **IS** there anything you would change

ALWAYS TRY TO BE POSITIVE!

Artist Analysis:

You need to show how you have been influenced by current and historical sources. Use the following questions to help you structure your writing. Always use your own words to express how YOU feel

Content

What is the subject matter? (e.g. seascape, portrait etc.)

Processes, Techniques and Media

How have they created their work and with what?

Formal Elements

How have they made use of colour, texture, pattern, line, shape, tone etc?

Meaning and Context

Is there a meaning/message behind the work?

Why do you think it was created? What do you think the artist wanted people to think about their work?

Finally

How will this artist's work influence your own work?

Idea Planning

In each project you will be expected to develop your own ideas in response to your title/theme. Use the below points to help you write your plans:

Which artist(s) have you been influenced by mostly?

How does this idea link to the rest of your project?

How does this idea link to the theme?

What will your subject matter be?

Will you need to take your own photographs? (Recommended)

Will you need a model or specific location?

What type of techniques and processes do you think you will be using. Why?

What is the main message you are hoping to convey?
