The term "Latinx" relates to people of Latin American origin or descent and is used as a gender-neutral or non-binary alternative to Latino or Latina.

Two half-sisters, Yahaira and Camino, adore their father, Papi. He spends most of the year in New York living with Yahaira and her mother. In the summer Papi visits Camino in the Dominican Republic. Grieving their father's death will the two girls meet in person, become friends, and be able to develop a true sisterly bond? And will they be able to forgive Papi for his secrets and deception?




DEAR HAITI, LOVE ALAINE by MAIKA MOULITE and MARITZA MOULITE

With demanding work and the company of her mother who seems to be escaping problems of her own, Aliane explores her parents' homeland for the first time and discovers a checkered family past.

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


EVERYTHING INSIDE by EDWIDGE DANTICAT

A collection of eight emotionally charged and absorbing short stories, most of which have Miami and/or Port-au-Prince, Haiti as the backdrop. Illness, death and mourning are recurring themes as the author explores family bonds, lost love and dormant friendships. An adult daughter travels to the bedside of the dying father she never knew; a woman puts her trust in her scheming ex-husband; a couple looks to rekindle love post-tragedy; a multi-generational family is confronted with depression and dementia; a man's final thoughts as he faces death; two stories where friends reunite; and the display of compassion for an ailing employee.

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


LOVE WAR STORIES by **IVELISSE RODRIGUEZ**

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


PRIDE by IBI ZOBOI

Set in modern-day Brooklyn, Zaboi's novel is a retelling of Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice. The main character is Zuri, a Haitian-Domincan teenager, who loves to write poetry and dreams of attending Howard University. She takes pride in her family and in a community that is facing gentrification, as wealthier families move in, most notably the upper class Darcys and their two sons. The Darcy boys take notice of Zuri and her sisters, and soon issues of class and love arise. Pride is a witty romance filled with poetry and cross-cultural imagery.

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


DAUGHTERS OF THE STONE by **DAHLMA LLANOS-FIGUEROA**

A debut novel about five generations of Afro-Puerto Rican women. The saga starts in the mid-1800s with the matriarch Fela, kidnapped from Africa and sold into slavery to work the sugar plantations of colonial Puerto Rico. The story continues with Fela's daughter and follows the female descendants to the mainland and ultimately New York. This is a feminist, matri-focal story exploring mother-daugther relationships, the ties to the past and navigating cultural divides.

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


UNDEAD GIRL GANG by **LILY ANDERSON**

I AM ALFONSO JONES by TONY MEDINA

Excited doesn't begin to describe Alfonso Jones when he learns he will play the role of Hamlet in his school's hip hop rendition of the Shakespeare drama. But when he's shopping for his first suit, an off-duty police officer mistakes a clothes hanger for a gun and shoots Alfonso. This graphic novel charts Alfonso's journey in the afterlife; he meets high profile victims of police shootings, who offer him guidance as he wanders the spiritual realm. This is a tough narrative that not only addresses the complexity and history of police brutality but also discusses climate change, gun control, the criminalization of Black males, the Black Lives Matter movement, youth activism, Afro Latinidad, and so much more. A timely read.
