Dear ***School/Teacher***,

I'm getting in touch as I wanted to discuss social inclusion and justice in PSHE. I've particularly been thinking about some of my experiences as a young adult and how there is so much more that young people, and our communities, can do to support each other.

It's been hard to not have been moved by recent events such as the murders of Brianna Ghey, Sarah Everard and George Floyd. Whilst in many ways not connected, these incidents share themes of discrimination and marginalisation. Organisations like Everyone's Invited have also shone a light on particular experiences of young people at school and the YMCA have recently released data suggesting that 95% of Black British students have witnessed racist language in school.

I think that it has never been more important to work with young people on these issues, finding ways to tackle social injustice through education and supporting students to challenge discrimination.
