Source Evaluation Acronym:

IMVAIN

- <u>Independent</u> sources are preferable to self-interested sources (sources motivated financially, religiously, or which are upholding family/cultural concerns, etc.)
- Multiple sources are preferable to a report based on a single source.
- Sources who <u>Verify</u> (or provide verifiable information) are preferable to those who merely *assert* opinion or "facts."
- <u>Authoritative</u> and <u>Informed</u> sources are preferable to sources that are uninformed or lack authoritative background.
- Named sources are better than anonymous ones.

The IMVAIN criteria has been divided up in the chart below:

	Substantive Evidence: How many sources are presented? Multiple? Single? Named? Anonymous?	Follow the Breadcrumbs: Verify the reliability of the sources, experts, or facts listed <i>in</i> the article (meaning do a little research of your own). Can you find similar information from other sources?	Origin: From what publication does this come? Are the publication and author credible/reliable sources of information?	Bias: Is the author/source independent or self-interested? Is the language objective and tone reasoned, or is it highly connotative or one-sided (not acknowledging other perspectives or not recognizing limitations or challenges)
