Abstract (Book Antiqua, Size 12, Bold, 1 space)

An abstract should accompany each manuscript. It should be entirely self-consistent (i.e., with no figure, table, equation, or reference citations), not exceeding 250 words, and written as a single paragraph. Abstract using English. We strongly encourage authors to use the following style of structure abstracts, but without headings: (1) Background: Place the questions addressed in a broad context and highlight the purpose of the study; (2) Methods: Describe the main methods or treatments briefly applied; (3) Results: Summarize the article's main findings; and (4) Conclusion: Indicate the main conclusion or interpretations.

INTRODUCTION (Book Antiqua, Size 12, Capitalize Each Word, Bold)

The main text format consists of a flat left-right column on A4 paper (quarto) with the page margin; left (3 cm), top (4 cm), right (3 cm), and bottom (3 cm). The manuscript is written in Microsoft Word, single space, Book Antiqua 12 pt., before and after paragraph 0 pt., minimum of 10 pages, and a maximum of 20 pages.

The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it is essential. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance. The current state of the research field should be reviewed carefully and key publications cited. Provide broad definitions and discussions of the topic and incorporate others' views (literature review) into the discussion to support, refute, or demonstrate your position on the topic. Please highlight

controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. Finally, we briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions.

METHODS (Book Antiqua, Size 12, Capitalize Each Word, Bold)

It should be written in paragraphs. It also explains the research approach, kinds of research, data collection technique, and data analysis. They should reflect and describe the purpose of the study appropriately

FINDINGS AND DISCUSSIONS (Book Antiqua, Size 12, Capitalize Each Word, Bold)

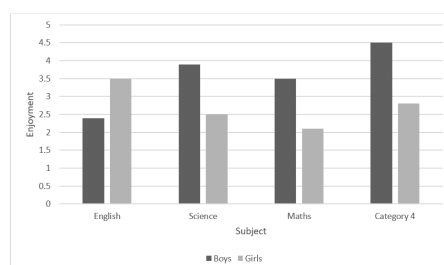


Figure 1. Boy's and girl's self-rated enjoyment of core subjects

CONCLUSION (Book Antiqua, Size 12, Capitalize Each Word, Bold)

Section title should be "Conclusion," not "Conclusions." This section should include brief points of the article regarding purpose, findings, and discussions of the research

REFERENCES

References should be cited both in the text (as running note) and in the references list. They should conform to the APA of 7th Edition style. It should be listed in alphabetical order. Please ensure that all information in the manuscript taken from another source is substantiated with an in-text reference citation. References consist of the citations in the publication text with a minimum of 12 references especially books and journals. References must be up to date. A minimum of 80% of sources published 10 years recently is required for each submission

Please note that your references must follow the *APA of 7th Edition style*. The editor will return the submission for correction if the writer does not read format references correctly. Author (s) may employ **Zotero and Mendeley** as the **Reference Management**.

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
