Brief Description of Bill: Relating to OFRI (Oregon Forest Resources Institute)

Transfers revenue from timber harvest tax to ODF to distribute not just to OFRI but to OSU programs in higher ed to implement environmental literacy; expands OFRI Board to include 1 environment rep and one fishery/wildlife rep.; prohibits OFRI from expending funds for certain advertising and instructs ODF to review communications for factual accuracy.

6. What is the likelihood that the bill will pass?

There has been one hearing and there were 27 testimonies opposing (primarily OSWA staff and members) and 9 supporting. It will be a challenge to pass.

I recommend that COIN supports this bill. OFRI was established by the timber industry and uses Oregon tax \$ to promote corporate interests. They claim to be educational and neutral, but their materials are not. OFRI discredits scientific publications from top researchers at OSU and is not supportive of climate smart forestry ie. (long timber rotations, plantation diversity)

Here is my testimony to the first hearing on HB 3019:

I am writing to support HB 3019, Relating to OFRI. This bill is long overdue in establishing changes in the budget and activities of Oregon Forest Resources Institute. For too long OFRI has been a mouthpiece for corporate timber companies and practices that are not in line with conservation of our forests and water. My husband and I have a woodland and farm in the upper Hood River Valley. We have some understanding of farm, forestry, logging and water issues and we disagree with the one-sided views on forestry that OFRI presents to the public.

One of the most objectional aspects of OFRI is that it is funded by Oregon taxpayer dollars. We shouldn't have to pay for PR and lobbying that benefits private forest industries. However, It isn't just the dollar cost; OFRi's actions influence opinions that affect Oregon's water, habitat and our capacity to cope with climate realities.

HB 3019 is a step in the right direction, shifting part of the harvest tax revenue that currently supports OFRI to fund OSU Programs including K-12 education that includes environmental literacy. Other positive parts of the measure expand the OFRI Board to include a more diverse, conservation- oriented membership, prohibits the institute from spending funds on advertising or outreach and gives ODF the responsibility to review the accuracy of OFRi's communications. I hope this bill moves forward successfully and ends up providing needed changes in OFRi.
