[Streetlights in Los Angeles are funded through a property-based streetlighting assessment that has not been updated since 1996 due to a state requirement that any increase be approved by a citywide ballot. Because raising the assessment carries political risk, the City has avoided doing so for decades.](#)

As costs increased over time, the City covered the gap by subsidizing streetlighting from the General Fund—the same pool of money used for essential services like police, fire, and street cleaning. Repeated budget cuts during recessions, including the elimination of pole replacement funding, were never restored. As a result, much of the streetlight infrastructure—some of it nearly 100 years old—has significantly deteriorated. This aging infrastructure now accounts for about 60% of current streetlight outages.

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The remaining 40% of outages are due to vandalism and copper wire theft, which has surged as copper prices increased. Incidents rose from just nine in 2006 to roughly 4,500 in 2021, contributing to tens of thousands of service requests citywide.

Temporary federal relief funds helped mask the problem in recent years, but those funds are no longer available. At the same time, the City faces major financial pressures and no longer has the capacity to subsidize streetlighting from the General Fund.

As a result, increasing the streetlighting assessment to match actual costs is the only viable long-term solution. In the short term, the City is prioritizing repairs in the most affected and dangerous areas and using limited discretionary funds for overtime work to address critical outages.

Crime trends in the community are generally improving. Compared to last year, reported rapes are down 46% (8 this year compared to 15 last year), and robberies are down 22% (21 in 2025 versus 27 in 2024). Burglaries are down significantly—31%, dropping from 152 incidents in 2024 to 104 in 2025. Overall, violent crime is down 6.7% in the area.

Aggravated assaults are up, though many of these incidents involve domestic disputes. Thefts, including package theft and vehicle-related theft, have increased slightly, with 174 reported thefts in 2025, about 6% higher than 2024. Residents are strongly encouraged to continue reporting these crimes, as reporting helps police identify patterns and suspects. Recent arrests have been made possible because residents provided videos and photos.

The department believes that having more officers directly contributes to community safety, and current leadership supports that approach.

Party houses remain an issue, particularly in the Hollywood Hills, though the problem has improved compared to previous years. Residents are urged to report party houses as they are happening, using the non-emergency number rather than waiting days to report them. If residents feel safe, videos can help officers issue administrative citations and work with the City Attorney’s Office to hold property owners accountable. Additional funding from a council office helps provide extra officers—sometimes two to four—specifically to address party house enforcement.

Residents may experience delays in response times due to staffing limitations, but reporting still matters. Even when officers cannot respond immediately, reports help police track trends, deploy patrols more effectively, and focus enforcement in problem areas.



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For emergencies, residents should always call 911. For non-emergency crimes like package theft or vandalism, online reporting is encouraged. These reports take about 10–15 minutes, help with insurance claims, and provide critical data that guides patrol deployment.

The department emphasizes its partnership with the community and encourages residents to continue sharing concerns, reporting issues, and communicating with officers to help keep the neighborhood safe.

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2025 Outpost Neighborhood Association Priorities

The 2025 priorities of the Outpost Neighborhood Association (ONA) Board are listed below and are developed each year with input from Outpost Estates Stakeholders. There are four main categories of priorities: neighborhood safety, traffic, beautification, and social/community building.

1. **Neighborhood Safety** - Add flock safety license plate reader cameras to the neighborhood entrances that automatically connect to the Los Angeles Police Department to help catch and deter crime.
2. **Neighborhood Safety** - add 40 houses that utilize POST Security so that Outpost Estates gets an 8 hour dedicated patrol car.
3. **Neighborhood Safety** - advocate for wildfire brush clearance and wildfire prevention measures.
4. **Traffic** - fundraise to complete the installation of additional traffic islands on Outpost Drive.
5. **Traffic** - continue to advocate for traffic improvements related to the Hollywood Bowl and safety improvements regarding the traffic flow on the hillside streets.
6. **Traffic** - advocate for street repairs and to refresh the red curbs in the neighborhood.
7. **Beautification** - maintain the Outpost Drive landscaped traffic islands and help ensure brush is cleared around street lights, curbs and street signs.
11. **Beautification** - declutter the street signs off of the historic street lights and reduce number of street signs/posts around neighborhood.
12. **Beautification** - plan for improvements (like landscaping or Outpost Estates signage) to the 'Outpost Wall' and the entrance to the neighborhood at Outpost Drive and Franklin Avenue to beautify the entrance/welcome points to the neighborhood.
13. **Social/Community Building** - coordinate at least six social/community building events for the neighborhood (e.g., January - Annual meeting, February - Potluck, April - Earth Day, May - Cinco de Mayo Party, June - Pride Cocktail Party, July - BBQ, October - Halloween Open House, November - Post Thanksgiving Social, December - Holiday Social, etc.).
14. **Social/Community Building** - continue to network and engage with neighbors through welcome letters, free Hollywood Bowl tickets, WhatsApp group text, email newsletters, the ONA website and the neighborhood contact database.



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2025 Outpost Neighborhood Association Accomplishments

The 2025 accomplishments of the Outpost Neighborhood Association (ONA) Board are listed below.

1. **Neighborhood Safety** - Added two flock safety license plate reader cameras to the neighborhood as a test pilot on Outpost Drive.
2. **Neighborhood Safety** - connected neighbors interested in wildfire prevention measures to start the process to get Outpost Estates designated as a Firewise USA community and eligible for fire insurance discounts.
3. **Neighborhood Safety** - connected neighbors with Torch Sensors to install free wildfire sensors around Outpost Estates to monitor for brush/wildfires for early detection/warning.
4. **Neighborhood Safety** - negotiated with Post Patrol to get a dedicated patrol car exclusive for Outpost Estates for 8 hours per day 7 days per week if 40 more homes in Outpost Estates join Post and subscribe to their \$100/month security plan.
5. **Traffic** - received a \$25,000 grant from the LA Parks Foundation, Live Nation Hewitt Silva, and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association to complete the installation of additional traffic islands on Outpost Drive at La Presa and Chelan.
6. **Traffic** - worked with neighbors that were opposed to the installation of a landscaped traffic island at Mulholland and Outpost Drive and removed that traffic island from the scope of the project based on neighborhood feedback.
7. **Traffic** - worked with the Hollywood Bowl to advocate for traffic improvements related to the Hollywood Bowl and safety improvements regarding the traffic flow on the hillside streets.
8. **Beautification** - maintained the existing Outpost Drive landscaped traffic islands and helped clean up entrance points to the neighborhood like at Franklin/Outpost and Outpost and Hillside.
9. **Beautification** - worked with LADOT to “declutter” the street signs off of the historic street lights and reduce number of street signs/posts around neighborhood.
10. **Social/Community Building** - coordinated several social/community building events for the neighborhood (e.g., January - Annual meeting, February - Potluck, April - Earth Day Recycling Event, May - Cinco de Mayo Party, June - Pride Cocktail Party, July - BBQ, October - Halloween Open House, and December - Holiday Social, etc.).
11. **Social/Community Building** - continue to network and engage with neighbors through welcome letters, free Hollywood Bowl tickets (over 310 free tickets distributed), WhatsApp group text (connecting over 240+ residents together), email newsletters (with a distribution list over over 900 contacts), the ONA website (with over 19,000 visits) and the neighborhood contact and referral database.

How donations are used:

1. **Neighborhood beautification and maintenance** - Weekly care of the five traffic islands on Outpost Drive (trimming, trash removal, and irrigation checks). Periodic clean-ups along key corridors and at neighborhood landmarks, plus seasonal storm prep (clearing street drains) and brush clearance around curbs, historic street lights, and street signs.
 - a. Typical costs:
 - i. Ongoing gardener/vendor services: ~\$300 per month.
 - ii. Periodic needs such as brush clearance or special projects (recent examples: ~\$1,250 for annual brush clearance; ~\$1,650 for island maintenance/beautification at El Cerrito & Outpost).
2. **Community events that bring neighbors together** - Annual Meeting, Earth Day, summer gatherings, Halloween/Open House, holiday socials, and small block meet-ups. Recent examples include reimbursements for Annual Meeting refreshments and event signs.
 - a. Typical event spend: ~\$600 per event for food, beverage, signage, and supplies.
3. **Communications and outreach** - Website hosting on Squarespace (about \$275/year) and domain registration (~\$20 at renewal). Printed materials for signs, flyers, mailers, and occasional postage.
4. **Insurance, compliance, and basic operations**
 - a. Insurance: Directors & Officers and General Liability (recent annual renewal ~2,600; amounts may vary year to year).
 - b. PO Box for official mail (~\$375/year).
 - c. Required annual filings (IRS, California Franchise Tax Board, California Attorney General's Registry of Charitable Trusts, and Secretary of State). Filing fees vary by form and year (recent examples in the \$55-\$500 range).
5. **Safety and community partnerships** - Modest, occasional expenses that support neighborhood relationships and collaboration (for example, thank-you gestures after coordinated efforts, or sponsoring the National Night Out event).
6. **Neighborhood Improvement Projects (e.g., landscaped traffic island installation or neighborhood security cameras or signage)** - Engineering, permits, and traffic control planning to complete the long-planned island improvements. A significant portion of our bank balance is earmarked for this project so work can proceed once approvals are finalized. Recent example: professional services for pre-construction permit assistance and a traffic control plan.

Other funding that helps stretch donor dollars:

1. **Grants:** As a non-profit, ONA applied for various matching donor grants or grants given for a specific purpose like the \$25,000 received from the LA County Parks Foundation and the \$7,500 NBC Universal matching donor grant for the landscaped traffic island installation project.

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2026 Outpost Neighborhood Association (ONA) Board Elections

The ONA Officers and Directors (the “Board”) is comprised of unpaid volunteers that are residents of Outpost Estates. The ONA Board is made up of 7 people: four Officers (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) and three Directors that volunteer to Chair or Co-Chair various Committees, or support ONA in other ways.

The ONA Board is elected for a one year term each January at the in-person ONA Annual Meeting by current ONA supporters. Once the 7 Board of Directors are elected at the ONA Annual Meeting, the Board of Directors then vote on which of the 7 Board of Directors will serve as the four Officers (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) for the one year term.
