In an age when one person (usually a man) held ALL the power, and used this power for whatever they wanted, Cromwell showed England a different way.

Under Cromwell's rule, England's justice system became less corrupt. In matters of religion, he allowed freedom of worship. However, Oliver Cromwell's legacy always takes a dark turn when you look to Ireland. He ordered the massacres of almost 3,500 men who had already surrendered. He did this often. His actions replicating that of an evil dictator.
