

Leprechauns are mythical creatures, often depicted as small, bearded men dressed in green coats and buckled shoes. According to Irish legend, they are solitary fairies who spend their time making shoes and hiding their pots of gold at the end of rainbows. The lore suggests that if one manages to catch a leprechaun, the creature must grant three wishes or reveal the location of its treasure. However, note that leprechauns may be fictional beings, and there is no scientific evidence to support their existence. Leprechaun traps are typically constructed from everyday materials, such as shoeboxes, cardboard, and craft supplies. They often include enticing elements like fake gold coins or shiny objects to lure the leprechaun in.

There have been leprechaun sightings, and one of the most famous is the Crichton leprechaun, who was spotted and videotaped by a tree in Alabama. On March 14, 2006, local NBC affiliate WPMI-TV was alerted to crowds gathering in Crichton, and dispatched reporter Brian Johnson to investigate. Johnson had previously received numerous calls about possible leprechaun sightings and questions about it from friends at a barbershop and his church. "Things sort of snowballed" when the crew arrived, anchor Scott Walker later recalled, with multiple people claiming to have seen a leprechaun in a tree. Crichton resident Nina Thomas-Brown submitted a crudely-drawn sketch of the supposed leprechaun. Although the sighting is really old, it got over 23 million views as of 2023.
