Ethics of Zoos from a Global Perspective

Introduction

Students will work collaboratively with the instructor to design the course together. Students will suggest relevant readings, documentaries/films, and field trips for the course and work together to outline a schedule that explores all of these things. Students will also decide together on a final project that will share our findings about ethics of zoos throughout the world with interested parties. If students cannot decide on a final project, the instructor will assign the creation of a website where viewers will learn best practices for visiting zoos that treat animals ethically.

This course was designed with the LC learning objectives in mind:

- 1. To develop critical, analytical, and investigative skills to formulate educated responses to a specific problem or question
- To develop personal and leadership skills to work collaboratively toward the completion of a common project
- 3. To develop skills and awareness as concerned and engaged global citizens

as it is centered around the question, "Are zoos ethical?" In also keeping with the LC goals, we will investigate this question not just for zoos in the United States, but throughout the world, and seek ways in which we can make change with regards to the treatment of animals everywhere.

An important aspect of this LC will be the travel to zoos in Southern California, but also observation of animals in their natural habits. While visiting these places, we can observe animals and speak to employees about the mission of their institutions.

Abstract for LC (from Brightspace)

In this LC, we will seek to investigate the question, "Are zoos ethical?"

A zoo is a facility in which animals are housed within enclosures, cared for, displayed to the public, and in some cases bred for conservation purposes. As we question the ethics of zoos, we will look at their history and how they exist in today's world, throughout the world. We'll ask ourselves: What's good about zoos? What's bad about zoos? Are they beneficial? Are they harmful? Are they necessary?

Working together with students, we will decide how we can properly investigate our question and then put that plan into action during our winter term.
