### **Discussion Questions:**

- What is the book's primary theme?
- The book addresses several issues that are not fair. What are they?
- Can punishments be fair? Why or why not?
- Define the character of Zoe's grandmother. Would you describe her actions as good or bad? Why?

- Zoe realizes that sometimes people do the right things for the right reasons. Can you think of an example in which this has happened in real life?
- Define the word, bias. What is an example of it in the book?
