
The Politics Curriculant

The intentions behind whole school approach to curriculum design taken by senior leaders are to provide:         <ul> <li>Breadth - We intend to provide a broad, academic and liberal curriculum that equips students with the body of human knowledge and different ways of thinking necessary to succeed in and enjoy their education, careers and wider lives.</li> <li>Depth - We do not want our students to simply study the national curriculum and examination specifications with grades being our sole focus. We aim for our students to become true scholars of the disciplines that they are learning so that they achieve a deep and sophisticated level of knowledge and understanding.</li> <li>Values - We aim for our students to develop our four core values: commitment, courage, compassion and creativity.</li> <li>Democracy - We aim for all our students to have the necessary knowledge and confidence, not just to participate in the democracy of the United Kingdom, but to lead it.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>				
Subject Curriculum Intent:	The Politics curriculum is designed to develop students into critically aware, politically literate individuals capable of engaging with complex political systems and ideas. It equips students with an informed understanding of the structures, ideologies, and issues that shape political life in the UK and globally. Through the study of political participation, institutions, core and non-core ideologies, and comparative systems, students gain the analytical skills necessary to evaluate contemporary developments and the principles underpinning political governance.  Our curriculum fosters debate, independence of thought, and a respect for diverse perspectives. It encourages students to explore how political decisions are made, the impact of political ideologies on society, and the rights and responsibilities of individuals and institutions. Through a focus on real-world case studies and political thinkers, students are challenged to engage critically with current affairs and historical context, enabling them to become active, informed citizens prepared for higher education, employment, and civic life.
