Using digital storytelling to capture immigration stories is a powerful way for teachers to create opportunities for “empathetic moments” among students and shape their classroom environments. Digital storytelling offers the advantage of authentic engagement to reach all learning styles as well as to teach technological skills while exploring connections and understandings to an important issue. In this Common-Core aligned unit plan, teachers are guided step-by-step through a process for launching a digital storytelling project on immigration in their own classrooms.
