Directions:

- 1. Read *Twelve Angry Men* by Reginald Rose. Mark and label examples of **bias.** When do characters allow their personal backgrounds and prejudices to influence their opinions and choices?
- 2. As you read, type your responses into the chart below to help you keep track of the different jurors.
- 3. As you read, type your answers to the questions that are after the chart.

*Note: in a criminal case, a jury's decision must be **unanimous**, meaning that all twelve of the jurors must agree that the defendant is either guilty or not guilty.
