Parent and Family Communication Best Practices:

- Call or send message to every parent with introduction
- Establish a clear plan for communication
- Have a tracking system to ensure you're communicating equitably, and then pay attention to that data
- Differentiate contact based on family needs/district or campus requirements
- Call for glows and grows
- Build a partnership

Type of Communication	Examples & Resources
Introductions	 This <u>resource</u> gives a brief sample agenda for an introductory call home. Consider sending a <u>BOY letter</u>, welcome video, or email to all of your students' parents and/or guardians Send a BOY survey to parents for information regarding their work schedules, preferred times/methods of communication and to get any additional info on their student/family
Positive Calls/Notes Home	 This <u>resource</u> will help you frame how to call home for positive news Send home positive notes or digital messages
Constructive Calls Home	Calling home with concerns can be tricky. This <u>article</u> can help you have the tough conversation.
Tracking Family Communication to Ensure Equity	 This Google Sheets tracking form is clear, simple, and easy to use. Plus, you can filter to equity check your interactions. This Google folder has several examples of parent communication tracking sheets, mostly printable.
Ongoing Communication	 Considering sending a <u>newsletter</u> home weekly, monthly, or quarterly to keep parents and families in the loop Send weekly videos or pictures of what has happened during the week in your class Leverage social media (don't share students faces) Invite your parents to your Google Classroom or virtual environment. Check out <u>Classdojo</u> to share behavior progress Send reminders via Remind and/or Talking Points (see below). Give parents periodic opportunities to give you feedback through sending out a google survey Partner with parents when challenges arise AND when you see growth and improvement
Whole Class Announcements	 Remind and Talking Points both provide whole group and individual texting capabilities without sharing your phone number. They also both have translation included into a variety of different languages and you can mass upload parent phone numbers to the apps to begin sending messages immediately.
Office Hours	 Consider holding virtual office hours for families or a "get to know the teacher" type event. Be sure to clear it with your admin before.
Website	 A class website could provide additional resources for students and families and provide a centralized place for parents to stay up-to-date on what's going on in your class as well as set up times to meet/talk with you.
