A documentary about Algerian musicians in France singing songs of exile and longing while blending and blurring boundaries between music genres. The film features Amazigh Kateb from Gnawa Diffusion, Markunda Awras, Mohamad Mahdi, Moumen & Djam, Malik, Gaada and Djamel Benyelles.

## Rango by Arab Lotfi, 41:48 mins, 2009

A documentary that charts the development of Rango, a mystical musical practice for communion, entrancement and soul-cleansing that was brought to Egypt by enslaved Sudanese people in the mid 1800s. It continued to be greatly practiced during social gatherings until it faded from popular use in the 1960s because of its affiliation with mysticism and the occult.

## Jai Bhim Comrade by Anand Patwardhan, 3 hours, 2011

A documentary that explores the the lives and politics of Dalit people in Mumbai, looking particularly

at caste tensions and violence stemming from the police killings at Ramabai Nagar, Mumbai in 1997. The film features Sheetal Sathe: a folk singer, poet, and Dalit rights activist from Pune, Maharashtra, who rose to prominence as one of the lead singers of Kabir Kala Manch in the mid-2000s.
