

## Name of Course: Photo II

### Course Overview:

**Summary:** **Photography II** is a trimester long course dealing with the basic principles, techniques, and processes of photography. Students will review the fundamentals of working with a variety of photographic equipment, including digital 35mm cameras, lighting, scanners, and possibly analog film, to shoot assignments covering a variety of subject matter. Students will develop an understanding of the technical aspects of the camera, learn about design elements in photographs, demonstrate basic knowledge of editing software, explore and discuss digital imagery in society, career options, and create a personal expressive portfolio. Students will be responsible for required readings for various texts, homework, journaling of ideas, shooting images outside of class time, and exhibiting their work.
