


12TH GRADE ENGLISH REQUIRED SUMMER READING

1984, by George Orwell (Note: Please buy the physical book, not the electronic version, and bring it to class. Please get ISBN number 978-0451524935. You can find it in many big bookstores or on Amazon).

You are required to complete the novel by the first day of class. Expect a quiz during the first week of school.

[1984 was] weaponized during the Cold War, enlisted as propaganda in the struggle against the Soviet Union. Today, all that really remains of that enemy is the North Korean regime, a sort of grotesque caricature of the world of 'Big Brother', where Stalinism has mutated into a hereditary absolute monarchy. - In your opinion, what did Orwell get right about the future? Where was he wrong?
