ABSTRACT (10 PT)

The abstract was written in English, Times New Roman 10, italic, not more than 250 words. Abstract consisted of a short background, research objectives, methods, results, and conclusion.

INTRODUCTION (11 PT)

Manuscripts are written with Times New Roman 11 pt, 1 (one) columns, 1 space density on space density, on A4 paper with a top-left margin of 3 cm and bottom-right 2.5 cm. First line indentation in each paragraph is 1.27 cm.

The number of paragraphs is not limited, but the contents must include the background, the aim of the research, the position of the research on previous research activities, and the novelty of the research. A theoretical foundation that directly related to the content of the article can be included but does not need to be made a separate sub-chapter. Introduction section should be avoided from a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results.

METHOD (11 PT)

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This section provide clear information of materials, instrumentations, and methods used in order to allow the work to be reproduced by the readers. Methods already published should be indicated by a reference: only relevant modifications should be described. For the chemicals, authors should provide details of brand and purity, for example: ammonia 25% (Merck Millipore). For the instrument, the author should provide information on the brand and type. If the instrument is a modification, then information about the modifications made is required.

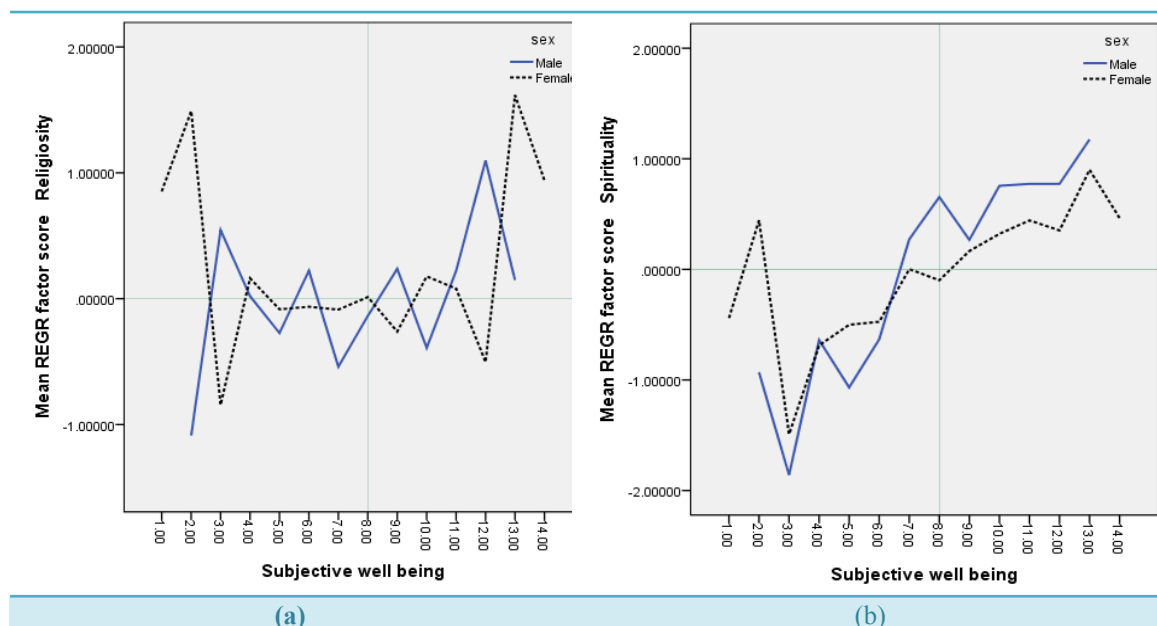


Figure 1. Religiosity, spirituality and subjective well being according sex.
The graph gender of (a) religiosity and (b) spiritualit

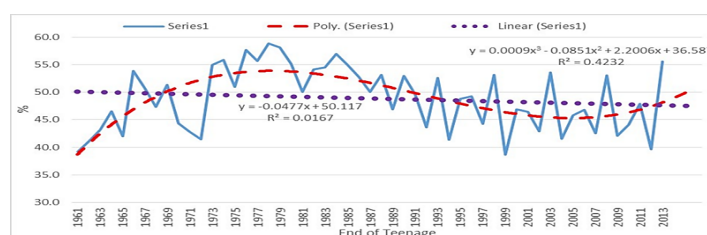


Figure 2. Modelling prevalence of teenage pregnancy 1961-2013

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION (11 PT)

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The explanations and information regarding tables and/or figures must state the number of the table/figure being referred to. The research results in the form of tables/pictures are placed at the end of the manuscript after the reference (not placed in the results and discussion).

Sub section 1

Equations should be placed at the center of the line and provided consecutively with equation numbers in parentheses flushed to the right margin, as in (1). The use of Microsoft Equation Editor or MathType is preferred.

All symbols that have been used in the equations should be defined in the following text.

Sub section 2

Proper citation of other works should be made to avoid plagiarism. When referring to a reference item, please use the reference number as in for multiple references. The use of should be employed for any reference citation at the beginning of sentence. For any reference with more than 3 or more authors, only the first author is to be written followed by *et al.*. Examples of reference items of different categories shown in the References section.

CONCLUSION (11 PT)

The main conclusions of the study should be presented in a short Conclusions section. Conclusions should answer the objectives of research. In this section, authors could also suggest future experiments and/or point out those that are underway. (Times New Roman, 11 pt)

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS (11 PT)

Advisors, financial supporters, or other supporters i.e. proofreaders, typists, and suppliers who have assisted authors in the research can be listed in this section. (Times New Roman 11 pt)

CONFLICT OF INTEREST (Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt, Optional)

If there are conflict of interest, it should be state clearly. Financial and personal relationships should be easily identifiable, leading to bias in work. The sources of funding for the work should be described explicitly with explanations of the roles of those sources, and the authors should state that the sources of support do not participate in specific roles. The authors should state that the authors have access to all the studies and that the sponsors have not interacted with the data or the work. Conversely, if the authors do not have a conflict of interest, they may find them expressly stately. (Times New Roman, 11 pt)

REFERENCES (11 PT)

The references used should be up to date (maximum of 10 years) and dominated of journal articles (at least 80%). It is highly recommended to use the reference manager to organize the references such as Zotero, Mendeley, Endnote, etc. The reference style used APA 7th

The recommended number of authors is at least 2. One of them as a corresponding author.
