Rule 4 – Vowels *a, e, o,* and *u* usually say *a, e, o,* and *u* at the end of a syllable (*na vy, me, o pen, mu sic*). (before)

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Rule 6 – The letter *y,* not *i,* is used at the end of an English word. (early)

e Job 3 – The silent final *e* makes the *c* and *g* say their second sound. (once)

e Job 1 – The silent final *e* makes the vowel say its second sound. (before)

e Job 5 – The silent final *e* does not have a job. (were)
