Biography:

Orlando Figes was born in London in 1959. He taught at Cambridge University from 1984 until 1999, when he became Professor of History at Birkbeck College, University of London. He was made Emeritus Professor on his retirement in 2022.

He is best known for his works on Russian history. A People's Tragedy: The Russian Revolution 1891-1924 (1996) won a number of international prizes. His other books include Natasha's Dance: A Cultural History of Russia (2002), The Whisperers: Private Life in Stalin's Russia (2007), Crimea: The Last Crusade (2010), Just Send Me Word (2012), Revolutionary Russia, 1891-1991 (2014) and The Story of Russia (2022).

He is the author of *The Europeans: Three Lives and the Making of a Cosmopolitan Culture* (2019), a history of Europe's cultural integration in the nineteenth century told through the intertwined biographies of Pauline Viardot, the opera singer, her husband Louis Viardot, an art expert and theatre manager, and the Russian writer Ivan Turgenev.

His books have been translated into over thirty languages. He is also a playwright. His play *The Oyster Problem*, produced in London in 2023, is about the financial crisis of the writer Gustave Flaubert in the last years of his life and the attempts of his literary friends, George Sand, Emile Zola and Turgenev, to find him a sinecure.

He lives in Umbria in Italy, and is now a German citizen.
